**Milton Victorious In Close Contest**

Milton and Campbellville battled out a close session on Saturday when Milton came out of the nine-inning stretch on top of the 5-4 score.  
 Melanson and Heipel scored the first two counters for the home team on an error and hit by a pitched ball. Campbellville re-couped with runs in the second and third frame by E. Cairns, who banged out a two base hit and Dowing on a single hit.  
 Campbellville grabbed the lead in the fifth frame when McPhail crossed the plate. The lead was strengthened in the seventh frame when K. Moore walked and scored.  
 Milton tied the game in the seventh with runs by Heipel and Melanson and added the single run lead in the ninth when Heipel banged out a single base hit.  
 Marshall was on the mound for Milton with Henderson doing the hurling for the neighboring team.  
 Milton claimed top honors in a re-play with Waterdown on Tuesday night when they took the team 8-5. The game was originally played May 15 and called at the end of six innings with the score at a 5-5 tie. By mutual consent, the game was replayed in Waterdown.  
 Waterdown piled up four runs on four hits in the first frame with Thomson, Jacob, Tindall and J. Thomson crossing the plate. Two other runners were stranded on second and third when Fetter was thrown out at first.  
 Milton regained only two runs in the first with Melanson rounding on a hit and Toletzka taking a walk. Stover was left on third.  
 In the third frame, Milton met a weakened Finnermore on the mound and piled up four runs on one hit to take the lead 6-4. Melanson walked, D. Vaughan and Grenke made first on errors and Stover walked.  
 Breaking into the scoring ring again in the fifth frame, Waterdown counted one run by North and Milton returned a run by Stover. The final count was added by the Milton club in the sixth when South banged out a base hit.  
 Kelly was on the mound for Milton and allowed six hits with three strike-outs. Finnermore for the home team allowed five hits with four strike-outs.

Dull, gloomy weather failed to dampen the spirits of more than 130 Halton Juniors on Saturday, June 13, when they held their County Field Day at Lowville park. County president Harold Tyrrell was chairman of the program.  
 The boys' softball tournament was the first event on the program with Palermo defeating Acton and Milton winning out over Norval. In the final round of the tournament, Palermo met and defeated Milton.  
 In the girls' softball competition, Milton emerged victorious over both the Acton and Palermo clubs.  
 Next on the program were both boys' and girls' tug-of-war. Milton boys proved their strength by out-pulling both the Norval and Palermo clubs, while the Palermo girls were the victors over Milton and Acton.  
 Another feature of the day's activities was the boys' three-mile cross-country run. The Palermo club, which had the greatest number of contestants finishing in top positions, was declared the winner. The first six runners were as follows: Ralph Langford, Acton; Edwyn Tyrrell, Palermo; Jack Proud; Palermo; Bill Somerville, Acton; Barry Archer, Norval; Clare Richardson, Palermo.  
 At inter-club competitions held previous to the field day, Norval club took the honors in both the rifle shooting and the girls' basketball competition.  
 The winner of the respective competitions will represent Halton county at the Junior Farmer District Field Day, to be held at the Ontario Agricultural College in Guelph.

**Easy 12 to 4 Win For Campbellville**

Campbellville won an easy 12 to 4 game over Georgetown Wednesday, June 10, behind the six-hit pitching of Harry Hamilton as the young right-hander won his second game of the season against no defeats.  
 Georgetown opened the scoring in the second inning when they got a run on a walk, a stolen base and a two base error by Jack Laking, but this was short lived as Campbellville struck for five runs in the third on three hits, an error, and a hit batman, and another in the fourth on a double, a ground out and a long fly; five more in the fifth on four hits, two errors and a walk and a final run in the sixth on two hits and an error.  
 Tommy Dowling led the Campbellville attack with a double and two singles. Bob McPhail hit two singles while Jack Laking hit a home run and Earl Cairns a double; Henderson, Bob Barlow, Bill Cairns and Hamilton all contributed singles. For Georgetown, Gilles had two hits and Kirkwood, Bruce Scott and Chappell had one each. Scott, pitching for Georgetown, gave up 12 hits, three walks and struck one out, whereas Hamilton for the winners allowed six hits, five walks and struck out two.

 Victoria St. The following motion was passed: "that acknowledging the inspector's report from the Halton County Health Unit re property at Victoria St., owned by Mr. Augustine Restivo, that the report be acknowledged and this council is wholly in accord with whatever steps may be taken by the Health Unit to remedy the situation, condemning if necessary."  
 A letter from C. W. Leske, executor of the Fred W. Armstrong estate, asked abatement of 1953 taxes on the ice arena. Council took no action and left this matter over as the abatement of 1952 taxes had just been passed.  
 A motion, sponsored by McKerr and McMaster, read as follows: the town foreman was asked to furnish the council with a daily statement, along with the mileage account at the end of each month.  
 A letter from the Department of Municipal Affairs suggested to council that the proposed fee for licensing hawkers and peddlers was too high at \$200. This matter will be dealt with at the next meeting.  
 A letter was read from F. M. Graham requesting that the town clean up a lot next his place and have it drained. This lot has recently been sold and it is expected a house will be erected here this year. At that time it is expected the lot would be graded.  
 A report from T. H. C. Terrell on proposed building in the Bousfield survey and the township was referred to the Planning Committee for further study.  
 Councilors Childs submitted prices for the extension of a 6" water main on Main St. East and Ontario St. He also submitted estimates on the new main for Ontario Steel Corporation on Martin St. Council decided to instal the line on Main St. East and get prices for the next meeting on sewer and an 8" water main for the Ontario Steel Corporation.
