Your Liberal Candidate

No one who desires a reduction in Federal expenditures or who hopes for lower taxes can possibly vote for a Conservative candidate. A Conservative vote, as the record proves and as Mr. St. Laurent has been pointing out is a vote for a vastly increased Federal budget and for increased taxes or debt. There is no hope, absolutely none, of reduced expenditures from the Conservative party or, indeed, from any of the splinter parties. At the same time George Drew has been going from platform to platform promising a beautiful half billion dollars off the national budget. He has been committing the Conservative party, most solemnly, to measures which will increase Federal expenditures by at least another billion dollars.

It is true there has been some talk in Halton by the Conservative candidate that such things as telegraphs, telephones and communications for the Canadian government cost too much. It should be pointed out that communications for a nation will run into a substantial amount when the navy, army and air force are operating in six foreign countries and coast to coast in Canada. A major amount of the appropriation authorized by parliament was for the construction, installation and maintenance of telephone, teletype and wireless facilities for the armed forces, including radar stations. The Tory candidate claims this is "reckless free-spending in the Defence Department."

Point three of the Tory promises calls for a Dominion-provincial tax conference to revise our whole system of taxation "so that taxes on homes and farm lands for education, health and other services can be substantially reduced."

Reducing the taxes on homes and farm lands for education and health services does not eliminate the costs of those services. If the local authorities have their share of the costs lightened and are thereby enabled to reduce taxes, then proportionately the cost burden on the other governmental authorities goes up. This move would of necessity involve an increase in federal expenditures.

The Conservative promise on housing states that the party will introduce a housing program which will make it possible for small income earners to buy new homes. This would be done by "improving" the terms and conditions under which houses can be built and purchased. Here again these things can only be done by subsidy or higher Federal expenditures on housing than are now being made by Ottawa.

No country in the world has had a higher proportionate increase in housing than we have had since the war. But it is difficult to imagine how a Conservative government could get more houses built without spending more money. This is the sort of financing that is supposed to win friends for the frustrated Tories. Actually neither Mr. Drew or any of his candidates appear to be too familiar with sound financing. And with all this talk about "holidays" I can say only this: If through apathy, the government is defeated on August 10 the evidence is that the people of Canada and of Halton may have more holidays than we'll know what to do with.

Hello Homemakers! With the weather warm as it is, we look for cool refreshments that can be done up ahead of time, covered and placed in the refrigerator until the table is set—and what is easier than jellied salads. Cool and inviting, piquant in flavor, even the simplest mixture has appetite appeal.

For slices of cold roast pork of tenderloin prepare a mold of gelatine made with apple juice and the addition of a grated carrot and minced cucumber with one pinch of cinnamon. It is something to remember. Also serve potato salad with sliced radishes and top the meal with orange sherbet and cookies.

Both the lemon and pineapple-flavored gelatin may be combined with tomato juice or water with seasonings to achieve intriguing flavors. When the mixture begins to jell add chopped crisp greens to make a hearty yet pleasant salad.

Although lettuce frames most salads, there's no need to disregard additions to it or forget chopped spinach, chard, romaine or a few nasturtium leaves and parsley twigs. Almost anything that you grow in the kitchen garden can be cleaned, chilled and clipped for a tossed salad bowl—mint, thyme, chives, green beans, grated raw beet, carrot, turnip, radishes, tomatoes and such. When a slightly beaten egg white is dribbled over the prepared bowl it prevents the salad dressing from soaking into the greens during lunch.

As for main course salads you rely on diced cooked meat or chicken, flaked fish or hard cooked eggs, combined with raw or cooked vegetables, for that satisfying quality we expect of a meal.

TAKE A TIP

1. When making molded salads that require grated onion and vinegar use the vinegar from a bottle of pickled onions.
2. Small molds set more speedily than large ones—so use custard cups or wax paper cups.
3. Rub the molds with a very little melted shortening or oil or French dressing before filling.
4. To ease the unmolding of any mixture dip the containers in and out of a bowl of hot water, shake sideways and turn quickly on the plate inverted over them.
5. Shake washed greens in a clean towel or let drain in a sieve or colander.
6. Be sure to wash all sprigs of greens even though it's one nasturtium leaf. Garden sprays and insect bites may permeate through salad.

Salad Stuffed Rolls
1 cup of cubed cooked chicken (or flaked salmon)
1 cupful of chopped celery
1/4 cupful of chopped sweet pickle
1 hard-cooked egg, chopped
1 cupful of salad dressing
6 wiener rolls
Combine the ingredients and fill split rolls with the mixture. Six servings.

Molded Salmon Salad
2 cupfuls of cooked, flaked salmon
2 tbsps. of chopped green pepper
1 tsp. of salt
1/2 tsp. of paprika
2 tbsps. of lemon juice
1/2 cupful of thinly sliced celery
1 to 2 tbsps. of chopped capers, if desired
1 tbsps. of plain unflavored gelatine
1/2 cupful of cold water

Combine the flaked salmon with the chopped green pepper, salt, paprika, lemon juice, celery, capers and mayonnaise. Soften the gelatine in the cold water for 5 minutes, then dissolve over hot water. Combine with the salmon mixture and turn into individual molds, or a loaf pan, previously rinsed with cold water. Chill until firm and serve, unmolded, on crisp lettuce, with a garnish of lemon sections and sprigs of watercress. Six to eight servings.

Cheese and Fruit Salad

2 tbsps. gelatine
1 cup canned pineapple juice
3 cups cottage cheese
1/2 cup dried apples
1/4 cup drained pineapple
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1 tsp. salt
3 tbsps. lemon juice
Soften gelatine in pineapple juice and heat; simmer until dissolved; cool. Blend cheese, chopped apple, pineapple, mayonnaise, salt, mustard and lemon juice. Blend gelatine into cheese mixture and turn into mold. Chill until firm.

Frozen Peanut Butter Salad

1 (3 ounce) package cream cheese
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1/2 cup peanut butter
1 cup chopped celery
1/2 tsp. salt
Juice of 1 lime
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1/4 cup heavy cream whipped
Blend all ingredients and fold in whipped cream. Pour mixture into refrigerator tray and chill until firm.

Peppy French Dressing

1 can condensed tomato soup
1/4 cup vinegar
1/2 cups salad oil
1/4 cup sugar
1 tsp. salt
1 tbsps. Worcestershire Sauce
1/2 tsp. dry mustard
1/2 tsp. paprika
Dash of cayenne
1 garlic bud

Place all of the ingredients, with the exception of the garlic bud, in a bowl and mix with the mixer or rotary beater until well blended. Pour dressing into a jar or bottle and add the garlic bud. It will contribute an extra hint of flavor. Cover jar and store in your refrigerator. (Approximately 1 quart).

Plunge To Death With Drink Secret

The leprechaun — traditional Irish symbol of good luck — is said to bury his crock of gold at the end of the rainbow and anyone fortunate enough to catch sight of this imp and follow him to his hiding place was, according to legend, richer by the pot of glittering gold pieces.

Another legend centuries old, concerns heather wine, an elixir made famous in war and song. Legend has it that the secret recipe was known to only one clan in all Gaeldom — the O'Donchu of the House of Heber in Kerry. War-like clan after war-like clan tried to lay hold of the recipe from the O'Donchu without success until the chief of the O'Brien clan, Cualta the Wolf, declared he would take the last road to make the secret his own.

In a fierce battle between the two clans, Cualta killed all but the chief of the O'Donchu and two of his sons. Led to a steep cliff, they were threatened with their lives unless they parted with the secret of heather wine. The sons, refusing to make known the secret, plunged to their death. Their father, apparently weakening, whispered the recipe into Cualta's ear and then, locking his captor in a death-like grip, sent them both to their death carrying the secret with them.

Irish tweeds reflect an autumn day in the Hills of Donegal or a row of stone fences in county Mayo. Weavers of these cloths draw on their colors from the landscape they know so well. Flecks of bright colors which mark the Donegal tweed, are the colors of the yellow gorse, purple heather, the brown bracken and a variety of shades produced by the changing seasons. In County Mayo, weavers interpret a rising hill with rows of stone fences by blending whites and greys.
