—New sidewalks were laid last week on Brown St. beside the arena.

—Power was cut off in Milton late Monday night and early Tuesday morning for about three hours due to trouble with the high tension wires.

—Charles Crumwell was sentenced to one year definite and one year indefinite in Magistrate's Court Wednesday, when he pleaded guilty to the charge of stealing Murray Grenke's truck on June 19.

—Milton Fire Brigade was called to two minor fires in Trafalgar township last Saturday in a hay field and a stump blaze. The alarm sounded at 3 p.m. and 6:45 p.m. and there was little damage in both cases.

—Hydro officials are making a survey of electrical machinery in Milton this week as a preliminary to the town's conversion from 25-cycle to 60-cycle. The changeover is not expected to be completed in this district until 1954.

—Forty-four members of the Milton and District Horticultural Society travelled by bus to Simcoe last Sunday where they attended church services and later visited the St. Williams reforestation plant and the McConnell Nurseries at Port Burwell.

—Bob Rumley, son of Mr. and Mrs. V. B. Rumley, Acton, has graduated from Guelph Collegiate Vocational Institute with his matriculation and Special Business Training course and has registered with the Canadian School of Embalming and Funeral Arrangement.

—Campbellville blanked Oakville 3-0 in the first of the county finals at Campbellville on Saturday.

—Three more Milton store fronts gleam with fresh paint — Eaton's Order Office last week and Tolczka's and the White Bakery this week.

—For the past two Saturdays, the quiet waters of Milton's mill pond have been the subject of Miss M. Jane Scott's Religious Thoughts column in the Globe and Mail. The pond has become such an institution in Milton that town residents tend to ignore the beauty which Miss Scott so keenly appreciated.

—A total of \$850 damage and a broken hydro pole resulted when a car driven by Mrs. Norman Wrigglesworth, Martin St., Milton, collided with a panel truck driven by William Ruigrok, R. R. 3, Milton, at 4:45 p.m. Saturday, July 25. Ruigrok was proceeding west on West Mary St. and Mrs. Wrigglesworth was driving south on Brown St. when the collision occurred. Damage to the truck is estimated at \$350 and to the car at \$500. Constable Sam Hall investigated.

—Close to three tons of sugar will be given out in the Milton Chamber of Commerce sugar draw before the contest closes in September. Tender Accepted For the Georgetown Addition

The tender of J. B. Mackenzie and Son for the building of the four room addition to Georgetown high school was accepted at a meeting of North Halton District Board on Monday evening. The price is \$117,000, less an adjustment in costs on the science room equipment, where plans are to be altered.

The deputation that visited the Department of Education in Toronto last Thursday reported that the Department would not consider a complete new school for Georgetown. It had been pointed out that if a new school was undertaken the grant allowance would be on the present basis of \$20,000 per classroom rather than the grant that had been allowed on a basis of \$30,000 per classroom. It was reported that the advice of the department was to accept the present tender.

It was estimated that \$138,000* would be required to build and equip the Georgetown school without the purchase of the proposed three acres.

The secretaries reported that no further negotiations had been entered into regarding the land purchase and the solicitor for the vendor had verbally informed him the Board's offer would be accepted.

Trustee G. A. Dills registered his opposition to the land purchase. He argued that the price was excessive at \$2,000 per acre; Acton had been able to secure suitable building land at approximately \$900 per acre and had refused to buy land offered at \$2,000 per acre. He felt that in view of the costs over the estimates, the land purchase should not be made. Other members expressed approval of the land purchase and that negotiations be continued.

The secretary read a letter from Acton council giving a resolution in which they refused to pay for removal of a hydro power line from the public school property. The high school board had agreed to pay their costs and hydro was to be asked to get the line removed as soon as possible so that building work could be commenced.

Mr. Barnett, architect, was present and informed the Board that plans and specifications for the Milton library classroom would be ready in a week or so when tenders would be received for this work.

There was considerable discussion regarding the amounts required for each school and the need for keeping the total costs with the overall amount of \$350,000 was stressed. Estimates were presented that Acton school could be built and equipped for less than \$210,000 while Georgetown school would likely cost \$18,000 more than estimates without land purchase. No motions were passed clarifying the amounts to be spent in the various municipalities. The figures for Milton are yet to be received.

Trustees Cleave, Cook, Beaumont, Dills, Brown, Reid, Carbert and Biehn were present and N. L. Pickett, chairman, presided.
