Declare Depression At New School Site

Four Palermo residents declared at a meeting of the Trafalgar public school board Monday of last week that the site for the proposed four room village school is on boggy land.

Harold Brittain, who acted as spokesman for John Van Sickle, Edgar Inglehart and Reginald Smith, stated that the school is in a depression and children skate there in the winter.

Chairman E. J. James said that the board was aware of the depression but it would be behind the school, which would be 150 feet from the second line.

It was decided that the township engineer and the Halton County health officer should be asked to investigate the area and submit a report.

William McBain and George Robb, Toronto architects, presented their preliminary sketches of the school, which will have two rooms on each side of the corridor. There will be no cellar.

The school will have an area of 5,600 square feet and includes a teacher's room. Mr. Robb told Inspector L. Skuce that there would be enough space in the boiler room to store the janitor's tools.

Inspector Skuce suggested that doors be placed in two locations in the washrooms so that there would be no congestion by people entering and leaving.

CO-OPS MAKE SEASON'S HOME DEBUT IN "BIG EIGHT" PUCK LOOP FRIDAY

Milton Co-ops will make their home debut of the season against Oakville Kelton Klippers on Friday night at 8:30.

The Co-ops, under Coach George Griger, have lined up a top flight team, considerably stronger than last year's outfit. Tommy Lemmon, star of Brampton Regents, has turned out with the Co-ops and is expected to add strength to the Co-ops' front line.

Johnny Heipel, Co-op's most valuable player last year, donned the blades on Sunday and the tricky centre ice man has lost none of his ability. The Klippers, who have won three of their last four starts, including a 6-4 victory over the Elmira Polar Kings, will be trying to make it a bad start for the locals.

Terry Sye will be between the posts on Friday night. Zip Thompson and Danny George are newcomers to this year's squad and teamed with Murray Grenke and Joe McCann, form a very solid defence.

Up front the Co-ops have four hustling lines with Art Melanson back at his old right wing spot with Fox and Townsley. Sharp shooting Gordie Cruickshanks is doing the pivot work for home-brew Billy Vaughan and Ben Simpson.

The veteran Nicky Ferri and newcomer Tommy Lemmon centre the other lines which Coach Griger is still juggling, trying to find the right combination. Griger has plenty of material to work with including home brew Walt Wilson, Ollie Raine, Johnny Heipel, Bill Andrew and Roy Luyben.

The Co-ops will be out to register their first victory at the expense of the Klippers and a large crowd is expected to be on hand to cheer them to victory.

Town foreman Bruce McKerr suggested a phone be installed at the pump house to eliminate some trips back to town in checking the water pressure and as a safety factor. He pointed out that daily visits would be necessary to keep the records necessary. Council approved the installation of the phone and approved payment of the house phone of the town foreman as had been previously done.

The foreman also suggested that the present surveyor's transit, which was very complicated to operate, be exchanged for a transit level which he felt would serve the town better in striking levels for ditches and tiling. The foreman and committee chairman were instructed to investigate this possibility.

It was reported that windows in the Fulton and Robert street pumping stations had been broken and would be expensive to replace. The council and mayor condemned this vandalism that was causing expenditures of the taxpayers' money unnecessarily. Since the buildings are heated to protect instruments, a double loss was being experienced.
