

### Capture First Place In Five Win Streak

Milton Co-ops moved into first place in the O.H.A. big eight intermediate league last Tuesday, January 26, when they defeated the Georgetown Raiders 9-3. It climaxed a successful week for the locals which saw them claim victories over Fergus, Durham and the Raiders.

On Friday night, January 22, the Co-ops defeated the Durham Huskies 6-3 in an exciting game which saw the teams go into the third period with the score tied 3-3. The Co-ops started the third period off

at a fast pace and dominated play throughout the final session. They fired three unanswered goals, the winner coming from the stick of Smoky Wilson, when his slap shot from the blue line caught the right hand corner of the net, leaving the Durham goalie little chance to stop it.

The two teams met again Saturday, January 23 at Durham and once again the locals took the measure of the high flying Huskies by the score of 5-4. This was the fourth straight win for the red hot Co-ops and goalie Terry Sye was terrific as he turned back shot after shot from every angle of the ice.

Nicky Ferri was the scoring hero for the Co-ops as the tricky centre-

man pumped home three goals and checked the Huskies into the ice with his poke checking. Durham yanked the goalie with a minute left to play (a move which paid off for them against Collingwood) in favor of a sixth forward, but goalie Sye came up with some sensational saves in the dying seconds to save the game for the Co-ops.

The game produced some rough hockey but the only extra time penalty dished by the referee was a misconduct given to Ferri when he pushed the official. Art Melanson suffered a nasty cut over the eye in the first minute of the game and Joe McCann retired midway through the third period with torn ligaments in his knee.

The Milton Co-ops protected their grip on first place when they defeated the last place Georgetown Raiders 9-3 on January 26. It was the fifth straight win for the George Grigar coached Co-ops. Sonny Townsley played a great game and led the Milton attack with four goals, Ben Simpson with two, Earl Fox, Zip Thompson and Nicky Ferri adding singles to round out the Milton scoring.

Milton took control of the game from the opening whistle and kept the puck hemmed into the Raider's end. The Co-ops ran up a 6-0 lead before the Raiders finally scored on Terry Sye.

Georgetown goalie Freddie Lever was especially sharp as the Co-ops rifled 39 shots at the acrobatic cage cop.

The line of Townsley, Fox and Melanson showed some fine passing plays and came up with five goals. Zip Thompson played a stand-out game on defense and led several dangerous rushes into the Georgetown end.

### SOFT GOAL FRIDAY GIVES KLIPPERS SINGLE GOAL LEAD FOR 4-3 WIN

A soft goal by Bruce Langdon gave Oakville Klippers a 4-3 victory over the Milton Co-ops on Friday night, January 29. It ended an uphill climb for the visitors which saw them overcome a two goal lead built up by the Co-ops in the first period.

Co-op defenseman Smoky Wilson gave the locals a 1-0 lead in the first period and Townsley added a nice goal before the period ended, to give the Co-ops a 2-0 lead.

The second period was a scramble throughout with both teams missing scoring chances. The Klippers finally scored late in the second period with "Blackie" Graham denting the twine, assisted by F. Milne.

Early in the third period, Blackie Graham tied it up on a solo effort and five minutes later, Ray Patterson put the visitors ahead when he took a pass from Ken Pollock and blasted it past Terry Sye, a low shot into the corner.

Earl Fox tied it up when he poked the corner after taking passes from Townsley and Melanson to give Co-ops their third goal of the night.

Bruce Langdon shot what proved to be the winner midway through the third period. In attempting to clear the puck from the corner, he hit one of the Co-op players and the puck trickled into the net.

Coach George Grigar had to juggle his lines as he had only eight forwards dressed. The injury riddled Co-op defense came up with a good display with Smoky Wilson and Zip Thompson playing terrific hockey. Co-ops were without Grenke and McCann, who are

both out with gimpy knees and Gordie Cruickshanks is in hospital having his appendix removed. Co-ops' next game is set for February 5 when Fergus Merchants play here.
