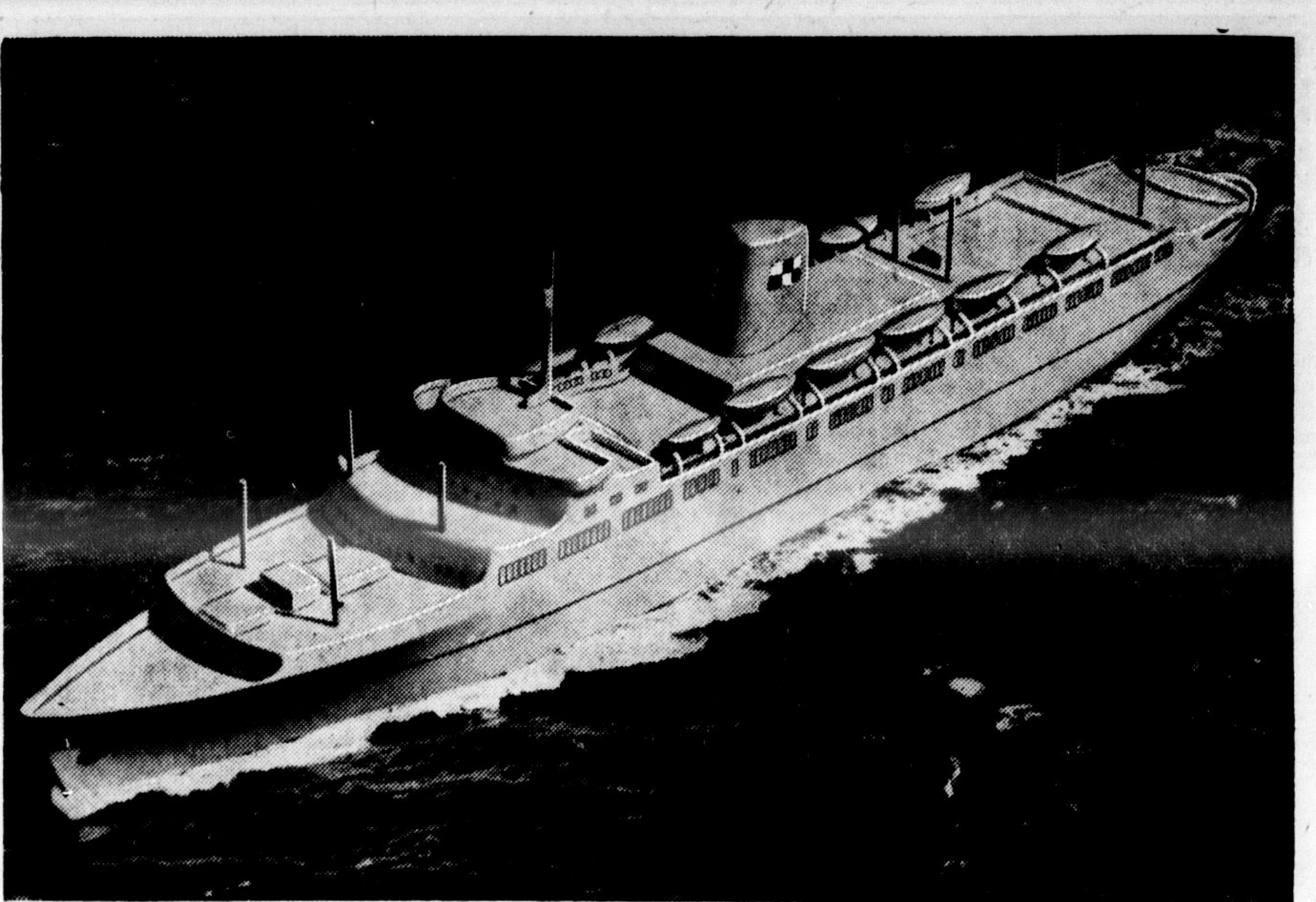

**OBITUARY Widely Travelled Was Born in Milton**

The death occurred Monday, March 29, of Agnes Elizabeth Hatton, widow of Harry B. Higinbotham, at her residence, Ker Cavan, Guelph.

Mrs. Higinbotham was born in Milton, the younger daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Hatton. The family moved to Toronto when she was a child, her father being interested in lumbering.

In 1908, she married Mr. Higinbotham in London, England, and from then until her husband's retirement from the Sun Life Assurance Company, their life was spent abroad in Belgium, France, Egypt, Japan and England. On their return to Guelph in 1930, they established their home, Ker Cavan, on Tyrcaethen St. Her sister, Miss Anne Hatton, resided with them until her death in 1944. An only brother, William Hatton, predeceased them.

Funeral service was held Thursday, April 1 in Guelph. Interment was in Woodlawn cemetery.

**Freak Receptions On TV Explained**

Mystery of wave-lengths is reduced to understandable-to-the-layman terms by one writer who says:

To transmit television signals it is necessary to use extremely short wave-lengths, so short, in fact, that they behave in much the same manner as light waves. Thus, under all but the most unusual conditions, even the most powerful television transmitter can only be received reliably for a distance of about 40 miles. Beyond this signals weaken.

The short radio waves tend to travel in a straight line rather than bend to follow the curvature of the earth.

It is possible, of course, to have excellent reception for much greater distances between heights of land. There are cases on record of receiving weak but steady pictures from stations hundreds and even thousands of miles away, due theoretically, to the reflection of the signals from freak atmospheric layers at great altitudes.
