F. O. Hunter New President
Halton Holstein Breeders

One hundred and fifty black and white enthusiasts attended the annual meeting of the Halton Holstein Club, held at Palermo on Wednesday of last week. C. F. Ficket, president of the Halton club, was in charge of the meeting. The morning session which got under way at 11.00 a.m. was given over to the reports of the Secretary, Treasurer and County Sales Agent. In addition, J. M. Fraser of Streetsville, president of the Holstein-Friesian Ass'n. of Canada, brought greetings from the parent organization, which incidentally is the largest and wealthiest breed organization in the British Empire. Mr. Fraser spoke briefly reviewing proposed developments in Record of Performance work which are to come up for consideration at the annual meeting of the Dominion association in Toronto on February 2nd.

The annual dinner served by the wives of the breeders of south Halton, as usual, resulted in a packed house. Numbered among the guests at this feature of the day's program were the members of the Milton Holstein Calf Club, David Pelletier, top Holstein Calf Club Member for 1948, was the recipient of the C. F. Ficket Special.

J. A. Carroll, Superintendent of Agricultural and Horticultural Societies for Ontario, was the guest speaker for the afternoon program. This organization has enjoyed many outstanding addresses during the past fifteen years but the thought provoking and constructive message delivered by Mr. Carroll was considered by many veteran breeders as second to none of the many excellent addresses heard in previous years. Mr. Carroll reviewed world conditions from a political and economic standpoint touching on Great Britain, France, the Berlin Lift, Israel, China, India and Russia. As a veteran of World War I, the speaker made it very clear that while he believed in preparedness—in the necessity of being ready to spring to the defence of one's country, nevertheless wars do not end wars. The solution in his opinion lies not in war, but in making democracy so attractive to other parts of the world that they will be prepared to adopt our way of life, which after all is patterned after the teachings of the Man of Bethlehem.

Others who spoke briefly during the day's program included Reeve W. H. Biggar of Trafalgar Twp.; Harry Hays, Halton representative on the National Holstein Directorate; Geo. Drennan of Guelph, Holstein fieldman; Frank Stark, of Milton; and Agricultural Representative J. E. Whitelock. The program also included two excellent films screened by R. S. Heatherington, National Film Board operator.
