# Feeding and Brooding Baby Chicks

Chicks properly fed and brooded make more rapid and economical growth than at any other period in the bird's development says J. P. Clerk Day of Sale. Walker, Poultry Department, Ontario Agricultural College.

Do not overcrowd; allow one-half to the City. square foot of floor space per chick W. C. Eves, Clerk. for the first six weeks, then one square foot.

The temperature, two inches above the floor at the edge of the hover, should be 95-100 degs. F. and the pen temperature 70-75 degs. The brooder temperature is then dropped 5 degrees weekly. Chilling Irish Cobbler Seed Potatoes and overheating cause digestive trouble and may cause mortality.

Extra humidity may be provided Table Potatoes, dry & white the first two weeks by placing a pan of water on the brooder stove or spraying the air with a little Galore Seed Barley, \$2. bus. water. The brooder house or pen should be well ventilated yet free from draughts and have clean dry

Chick starter, warm water and grit should be in the pen when the Power Cleaned. Free of Smut chicks are put in. Sprinkle feed and grit on paper around the hop-Fordson Tractor on 11" rubpers which should be placed like ber, reconditioned in 1948 spokes of a wheel around the hover. Allow six feet of hopper space per 100 chicks and one water fountain per 75 chicks.

Chick starter should be fed for 8-10 weeks or until the birds are put on range. Start feeding a little whole wheat at 4 weeks then start with whole oats.

Check the pen at dusk to make sure the chicks have not followed the sun's rays and piled up in a corner. Check the pen once more to make sure everything is in order.

Low roosts should be placed in the pen at 4 weeks to get the chicks started roosting early.

On warm days some poultrymen let the chicks out on wire proches, when they are 4-5 weeks old, to harden them and it also helps to prevent overcrowding and all its. Shows Nitely Start 6.30 & 9.30


