# EDITORIAL

So We're Old Dogs

During our years in public life and our discussion of public issues we have endeavored to present the issues fairly without resorting to calling those who are in disagreement with us by any descriptive names. We haven't always had the same treatment accorded us but last week was the first time we were labelled an "old dog." It comes from the editorial page of the Georgetown Herald.

"You can't teach an old dog new tricks" goes the saying, and we are inclined to think the Acton representatives on the North Halton High School District Board are putting themselves in the "old dog" category.

For the benefit of our readers we might give the information that the Acton representatives are Wm. Coon, Superintendent of Ajax Engineers and G. A. Dills, editor of the Acton Free Press and Canadian Champion, Milton. The Georgetown editorial after placing these two men where he thinks they belong then proceeds to quote the motion which appeared in both the Milton and Acton newspapers and makes some further comment on the High School District question as the editor sees it from Georgetown.

We do not intend to discuss the item, but we believe we should in all fairness give to our readers any information which we have. Herewith is a copy of a letter that the North Halton High School Board received over the signature of the Deputy Minister of Education. It's not from the lips of any official, it's not what might be described as current feeling or personal views. We believe an informed public is in the best interests of all. We are content with public judgment on any issue when all the facts are presented. We don't resent Mr. Biehn's anger or his slip of the pen and we know the general public are not vitally interested in what each may consider the measure of the other editor's stature.

The question under discussion is High School Districts and here is some further enlightenment and background for the "old dogs" motion:

> Toronto 2, April 7, 1948

Dear Sir:

Re: Temporary Additions to Milton and Acton High Schools

In reply to a letter from the North Halton High School District Board over the signature of your Chairman, Mr. C. A. Martin, it is noted that the efforts of your Board with respect to temporary accommodation for Shop Work and Home Economics without engaging in a building program have not

proved to be successful. It is, therefore, agreed that your Board may retain architectural service to prepare sketch plans for an addition to the Milton School comprising one General Shop-1,000 square feet and one Home Economics Room-1,000 square feet; and an addition to the Acton School to provide one Commercial Room of 800 square feet or preferably some rearrangement within the existing building that would provide satisfactory accommodation for a class.

When the sketch plans are completed they should be forwarded to this Department accompanied by your architect's estimate of the cost including fees and equipment.

Since it is not likely that your Board will be able to extend the benefits of a full High School education to the pupils in your district, then your Board should be informed that the approval as given should be recognized as a temporary expedient and in keeping with the unanimous opinion as previously expressed by the representatives of the High School Boards and the Councils concerned.

Your architect should be informed respecting the temporary use of the proposed additions and advised to exercise every economy with respect to cost of construction. It is hoped that whatever kind and class of additions are made will prove to be satisfactory to the Elementary School Inspector i and when the present schools are taken over for elementary school purposes.

It is strongly recommended that your Board should make every effort to select a permanent site and proceed with the erection of a satisfactory central High School which will serve adequately the educational needs of the pupils in your district. Your Board's selection of Mr. E. B. Riddell of Hamilton as architect is satisfactory.

The foregoing approvals are contingent upon your Board securing satisfactory assurances from the Ontario Municipal Board and the Councils concerned that the necessary debentures can be issued. Yours very truly,

Certainly they have a fine mess to clear up and must be commended for their courage in tackling the job. It is always fine to succeed where others fail.

#### An Important Decision

No intoxicated person may legally sit behind the wheel of an automobile, even in a private driveway, Mr. Justice Dalton Wells, of the Ontario Supreme Court, ruled after hearing a

"The Criminal Code sets out an absolute prohibition to anyone while intoxicated or under the influence of any narcotic to have care of a car, whether it is in motion or not," he said.

We never could understand why some innocent person had to be injured before courts could argue over whether the man was in charge of a car and intoxicated. More than ever it will be well to heed the warning "If you drink, don't drive." There can be no sympathy for the man or woman who endangers the lives of all others by making themselves unfit to drive a motor

### More Educational Opportunities

Recently there came to our desk a new journal called "Ryersonian". It aroused our interest so much that we made a trip to Toronto to see part of the "Ryerson Institute of Technology" and secured a copy of the 1949-50 Calendar just recently issued.

Here is what we consider the best approach to a practical education for boys and girls who do not plan to enter the professions. It's impossible to give all details that are illustrated in this 100 page book. There are ten departments scattered in buildings about the old Normal School with the entrance at 50 Gould Street in Toronto. To be admitted to the two year diploma courses applicants must have Ontario Secondary School Graduation Diploma or an equivalent standing may be considered by the Principal. The fees are not high for residents of Ontario and from what we saw the schools are splendidly equipped to give practical training in the various branches.

We would suggest that any young man who has no inclination to pursue academic courses beyond Grade XII secure information about the courses offered at the Ryerson Institute of Technology. The schools are under the Ontario Department of Education and we think every High School student should have an opportunity to see the new calendar. We imagine it's available upon request from School principals. It offers new fields for students who at this time may be planning their life's work.

In our opinion the Ryerson Institute is one of the most forward steps we have seen in our educational program. It's practical and will fill a need for training Canadian citizens. Our prediction would be that it will soon be taxed beyond the present quarters.


