MINT WILL MAKE 3,700,000 DECORATIONS

The amount of work that has gone into the minting of medals, campaign stars, clasps and oak leaves—the eagerly awaited Service decorations of hundreds of thousands of Canadian men and women—is revealed in figures released at Ottawa.

They show that to suitably reward all Canadians who served during the Second World War, more than 3,700,000 decorations must be turned out by the Royal Canadian Mint at Ottawa.

That's a lot of medals—and a lot of metal. Just how many pounds of silver, bronze and other materials, or how many miles of ribbon are involved was not revealed.

Figures for individual decorations as ordered by defence authorities from the Mint are just staggering.

As almost everyone who enlisted for "active service" is entitled to the War Medal, some 1,060,000 have been ordered. For sheer numbers this is rivaled only by the Canadian Volunteers Service Medal of which 900,000 medals and 524,000 clasps—denoting service outside of Canada—are being struck.

Other decorations and the number on order at the Mint are: 1939-45 Star, 288,000; Atlantic Star 40,000; African Star, 12,000; Pacific Star, 10,250; Burma Star, 5,200; Italy Star, 102,500; France-Germany Star, 250,000; Defence Medal, 460,000, and the Air Crew Europe Star, 12,000.

Obituary

REV. DR. C. T. SCOTT
Toronto

Rev. Dr. Charles Taggart Scott, 89, died Tuesday after fifty years in the ministry of the Methodist and United Church. He had resided in Toronto since his retirement in 1930 at which time he was minister of Melrose United church, Hamilton, built under his pastorate. In memory of the services of Mr. and Mrs. Scott, a stained glass window was erected a few years ago in that church.

Dr. Scott was born in Milton and was graduated from Victoria university in 1892. In 1908 the honorary degree of doctor of divinity was conferred upon him by Wesleyan Theological college, McGill university. Ordained in the Methodist ministry, he served in Central church, St. Thomas; Dundas Central, London; Douglas, Montreal; Colborne St., Brantford; Metropolitan, Victoria, B.C.; Bridge St., Belleville; Howard Park, Toronto, and Melrose, Hamilton.

For several years after retirement, Dr. Scott was assistant minister of Trinity United church, Toronto. A former member of the Wesleyan college teaching staff and board of governors, he was also on the board of governors of Albert college in Belleville. He was a member of Windermere United church, Acacia lodge, A.F. and A.M., C.O.F. and I.O.F., and the Field Naturalists club.

He is survived by his widow, the former Minnie White, with whom he had celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary; a daughter, Mrs. Arthur Kneeland, Montreal, and a son, Dr. Douglas E. Scott, Lexington, Ky., and three grandchildren.

Service and citizenship was the keynote of the Twentieth Anniversary of the Milton Branch, Canadian Legion celebrated at Legion Hall Monday night. Representatives from the Provincial Command, Zone and neighbouring branches were in attendance as well as a large number of past Presidents and Charter members.

Highlighting the event was the unveiling of a special plaque in honor of past Presidents who had served the branch since it was founded in 1929. Out of the sixteen past presidents who had served, ten were present, several having passed on, while others were unable to attend. T. A. Hulse, third Vice-President of the Provincial Command officiated at the unveiling ceremony. He congratulated the branch for the service it had performed during the past decade, praising those past presidents who had untiringly supported the Legion movement in Canada. He appealed to the younger veterans to become members, adding they would then be associated with the fourth largest body of organized people in the world.

Emphasizing there was a concerted effort by a subversive group to undermine the "very roots of Canadian citizenship," he urged members and Canadians to make use of their franchise election day to preserve the honor and freedom so many men gave their lives for in two conflicts. "It is the surest way to repudiate the dangers of the Communist party with its ideas of regimentation."

Following a brief business session, Comrade Frank Shannon turned over the gavel to Leo Cunningham, St. Catharines, Provincial Chairman to conduct the balance of the program. In a stirring address, he congratulated the Branch for its sincere service for those who had served their country in helping to preserve the ideals of our democracy.

Referring to the first World War, he said the younger veterans came back to a far superior program of rehabilitation than did the older veterans. He said that 90 per cent of the legislation for the veteran was presented and secured by the Canadian Legion, on their behalf.

Recently chosen Zone Commander A. Herd, of Port Credit, was present and pledged his support, to interest new members in Legion affairs. William Anderson, Oakville, former president of the Milton branch, declared the Milton branch by its activities through the war years, was second to none in the Dominion for providing comforts to the men serving the country. Shel Piper, President of the St. Catharines Branch spoke briefly.

The celebration was history making event in the annals of the branch, with a large turn-out of old soldiers reminiscing and recalling events of long ago.

Two letters of appreciation were received by the branch and read by Comrade secretary A. E. Armstrong. One from the British Legion, Scarborough Branch, England, read as follows:

"On behalf of the branch I beg to tender our heartfelt thanks for the marvellous food parcels (part of Princess Elizabeth's wedding present) sent to us for distribution to deserving ex-servicemen. The Mayoress of Scarborough presented the parcels to selected applicants and dear friends. If you had seen the faces of the applicants when the parcels were opened, you would have thought your money well-spent.

"In selecting applications for parcels, we gave first preference to TB cases, of which there is a great number requiring extra food to supplement the meagre rations our government is able to supply them with.

"Enclosed find letter of thanks from a person who was fortunate to receive a parcel. Thanking you from the bottom of my heart for your wonderful generosity and wishing your Legion every success.
