Moths Breed in Overlooked Places

According to entomologists of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, one of the worse breeding places of clothes moths is often 6 overlooked. If there is a hot air furnace, there are probably whole Hereford Steers, 1 year old: 3 colonies of moths in its cool air lects in the pipes.

A vacuum cleaner with a long easily, or even a long-handled HORSE-Black Percheron Mare, broom, will serve. The inside of the pipes should then be sprayed FEED - Quantity of Timothy as far down as possible with household spray containing DDT, or naphthalene flakes or paradiscattered in the pipes.
