JOHN LANNIN

John Lannin, one of the few remaining veterans of the Riel rebellion, died Friday at his home in Guelph. Native of Milton, he was in his 85th year. Lannin went to Guelph when he was 10, and nine years later went west to battle Louis Riel's uprising. The Riel veteran worked 55 years for the Griffin foundry, retiring 15 years ago. He was an Odd Fellow, Forester, volunteer fireman in his younger days, an ardent sport fan all his life, and attended Paisley Memorial United Church. Survivors include his widow, five daughters, Mrs. William Heibain (Ida), and Mrs. Bert Morris (Edna) both of Toronto; Mrs. Joseph De Shane (Emma), Mrs. Harry Bard (Fern), Mrs. Creighton Sanders (Reta), all of Guelph; a brother, a sister, nine grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

MRS. JOHN BLIGHT

Milton lost a respected citizen and active church worker in the sudden passing of Mrs. Margaret Jane Blight at Toronto General Hospital on November 20th. Rev. J. L. Blair conducted the funeral service from her late home on Charles St. the following Wednesday afternoon. Interment followed in Evergreen Cemetery at Milton. Born at Caledon, she was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Neil McEachern. Her husband Jno. W. Blight, for many years publisher of the Canadian Champion predeceased her six years ago.
