The LETTER BOX

Reply to E. H. Tilsworth in Canadian Champion, Jan. 26, 1950, re school project at Lowville AS WE SEE IT

I attended meeting in question on January 4th as an Association member.

We recall Mr. Clements attending this meeting and taking all details.

Could this be Mr. Clements composing? He, who is a has been according to the vote of the ratepayers of the township, will now be able to employ good sound, progressive administration to his soil on the farm. We quite recall our president stating the Association would carry on only in conveying the recommendations and wishes of the ratepayers to the Council and not in an advisory capacity. As we as an Association feel that we have chosen a very distinguished and desirable body of representatives to handle the affairs of our township. This should be proof enough that the people on election day with an overwhelming majority in making such a drastic change, do not believe in dictatorship such as existed last year. As for Mr. Tilsworth, we understand he is an American citizen, so is probably just passing his opinion in this unique way with a very congested bunch of figures. I understand that no parts of our petition has been discarded. All points are still open for discussion, which action can, according to the Department of Education, be taken on through our Council at any time as in respect to changing from one to two areas.

Please remember that election day results were the voice of South Nelson as well as North Nelson which should make unanimous the feelings of the Township as a whole. Granted, Colonel Hooper attended our meeting and was commended on his remarks. He told us they in Roseland had an Association similar to ours but regarded ours as the senior group and expressed his thanks for learning the true version and purpose of our Association. He also maintained that the getting together of these two groups would be a wonderful way for the ratepayers to become better acquainted and have a better understanding so that jointly these two groups could and should accomplish a lot for the benefit of the ratepayer as a whole.

Recently I was in conversation with the management of a building firm who are at present nearing completion of a four-roomed school with an auditorium in South Whitby at a cost of approximately \$130,000. Previous to starting this project, they debated on a 7-roomed school with auditorium in East Whitby at a cost of \$250,000. These figures are without inside fixtures. I ask you, can we in Nelson township build our school 35 per cent. cheaper than they in Whitby?

We also feel that the present Fairview site would be better suited to a skiing project than trying to transport pupils to — especially in winter weather.

In respect to our North Nelson schools we have two almost new schools, one repaired and put in good shape in 1949 at a cost we are told of slightly over \$2000. Two others, which with \$2000 each spent on them should put them in wonderful condition. Now, I would say there is too much difference between an estimated \$4000 repair bill and a new school at a cost similar to that which they have to pay down Whitby way!

I would like to ask one humble question! Do you think that the cleaning of our school toilets once a year could possibly help the sanitation situation or are they trying to spoil the morale of our children by leaving them until the spirit moves them?

Another question. Can we thank the Department of Education or could it be these so called old dilapidated schools which placed our province fifth in education out of nine provinces?

Sane thinking could hardly place the schools at fault. In closing, please bear in mind, Mr. Tilsworth, that our whole new Council, including Reeve and Deputy-reeve, are members of this Association of which you are frowning on.
