(Continued from Page One) government to compensate motorists who had their vehicles damaged by deer roaming the highways; also one from Perth asking greater restrictions be placed on displaced persons entering the country. Members said that some after being placed on farms only stayed a short time and went to other employment. Members also endorsed another asking the government to pay for polio patients confined to hospitals before their removal to hospitals recognized for the treatment of the disease.

Mr. Robinson, representative of the Canadian Institute of the Blind, was introduced by George E. Elliott. He asked council for the customary grant to that organization and also explained about the services provided to the 28 registered blind persons in Halton County.

A representative of the Ontario Lands and Forests Dept. urged the council to enter into agreement with the government in respect to care for the county forests. He said only a verbal agreement existed. This was left to the Agriculture and Reformation committee. Accounts approved and ordered to be paid included: Finance, \$2,920.13; Printing, \$611.80; County Buildings, \$1,134.60; Assessment, \$26.45; County roads, \$13,971.16; Hospitals, \$1,225.25; Agriculture and Reformation, \$653.63.
