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

If we could do as well generally in building up trade as we have done with Mexico, then, says The

Financial Post, our major economic

problems would be solved. Since the war Mexico and Canada have built up an exchange of goods more than ten times the value of prewar and the business is still growing. Moreover, it is not nearly as lopsided as that with so many other customers, and is largely based on goods which are unobtainable in the buyer's country.

Our imports from Mexico last year totalled \$25 millions. Biggest single items were cotton and sisal but there were also substantial quantities of fruits, vegetables, coffee and spices. Our exports to Mexico in the same period were worth \$15 millions with the major lines wheat, newsprint, aluminum, machinery and equipment.



> Development of the house-building patterns was a depression-born idea conceived by Donald Brann, of Briarcliff, N.Y. Building shelves and cabinets in an old house, Brann could not afford to buy any more lumber than he needed. Remembering the dress patterns he had once sold, he drew up full-size designs of everything he planned to construct. When enthusiastic neighbors borrowed his patterns Brann got a \$2000 loan, developed more patterns, had a few hundred copies printed and peddled them to hardware and lumber dealers. Today, Brann employs 18 men and has 6000 outlets selling more than a million of his patterns a year.

Licences Expire MARCH 31st

If you operate a Tourist Establishment, accommodating the travelling or vacationing public, and if you are not already licenced under the Game and Fisheries Act as an "outfitter", or under the Liquor Licence Act, you must apply before March 31st for a licence under the Tourist Establishments

> A Tourist Establishment includes: An Inn · A Lodge · A Tourist Home renting five or more rooms . A Cabin Establishment of two or more rental units . A Cottage Establishment of two or more rental units . A Trailer or Camping Park .

Licences are issued by municipalities, or, in that part of a territorial district without municipal organization, by the district inspector of the Ontario Provincial Police Force. The fee on first application is \$5.00 and on each annual

renewal is \$2.50. Fee shall accompany application. Operation without licence entails a maximum penalty of \$100.00 on conviction, as does any violation of the regu-
