Total value of minerals taken from the earth in Canada since the turn of the century Mr. Gemmell said, in addressing the Prospectors' and Developers' Association, is \$13,800,000,000, of which Ontario has produced over 42 per cent or about \$5,700,000,000.

Miners' licenses taken out or renewed in 1949 were 7,290, an increase of 1,300 over 1948; the number of claims recorded was 14,420 or more than 5,000 over the previous year.


