Milestone in Freemasonry St. Clair Marks 90 Years

Eight Lodges Represented at Celebration of 90th Anniversary
—Degree Conferred by Past Masters

Another record was written into the annals of Freemasonry in Milton on Monday evening. It was the occasion of the 90th birthday of St. Clair Lodge, founded on May 29th, 1860. There were eight lodges represented at this meeting to help St. Clair celebrate this important birthday, and District Deputy Grand Master, W. L. Somerville, representing Hamilton District A was also present.

The regular officers of St. Clair Lodge under Worshipful Master John Randall vacated their chairs for the past masters, who conferred the Third Degree upon Bro. L. Bird. The past masters were complimented on the way in which the degree work was exemplified. The following officers took part in the degree work: Wm. W. Bro. J. C. Cunningham; IPM, W. Bro. Others who took part in the work were W. Bro. C. Turner, F. Crawford, J. H. Willmott, F. McNiven, Geo. Galbraith, Geo. Dawson, S. Morris and E. Harrop.

W. Bro. M. S. Sproat gave a very interesting account of the history of the Lodge from its inception up to the present time. He read a history written by the late W. Bro. Wm. Pantton, in 1932 who joined the lodge when it was only 12 years old. It is believed that Wm. Pantton was the oldest Mason in St. Clair Lodge; he was for 63 years a Mason.

Among the older members of St. Clair Lodge who spoke briefly were W. I. Dick and R. C. Menzies. DGM Pat Somerville also spoke. He commended that a historian be appointed to preserve the history already written of St. Clair and to make a record of all important milestones of the Lodge.

After a lunch which was served by the Junior Warden the assembly enjoyed colored slides shown by Bro. Hartley Anderson. These slides were a pictorial record of a trip made by Bro. Anderson through the Southern States and in Mexico.

Oakville, the only other club playing Intermediate A ball in the Association, was agreeable providing the players concerned were not of active senior calibre. Bud Corbett felt that if senior players were allowed to play, it would cause concern to the association later during the season.

Other representatives felt allowing outsiders to play for these A teams, it would make the intermediate grouping rather top-sided, and less interesting for the fans. However the association granted both Acton and Fergus permission to play not more than five outsiders.

Final arrangements were made for play-off games between the three Intermediate A clubs at the end of the League series. It was agreed the second and third place teams would play a best two of three series, with the winner playing a best three of five games with the first place team.

Salaries Amended Needs Purchased School Board Meet

\$10,343.19 Accounts Passed at Regular Meeting North Halton School Board Meeting in Acton


At the regular meeting of the North Halton High School Board in Acton last Monday it was decided, on the suggestion of Lt.-Col. Gordon Brown, one of Esqueving's members, that councils of the five municipalities comprising the district be asked to agree to a new plan of sharing costs for operating the high schools at Acton, Milton and Georgetown. Each council has been asked to send a representative to a special meeting in Milton on June 8th when it is hoped a decision will be reached.

Municipalities will be asked to share costs this year on the new equalized assessment which is expected to be in effect in 1951. Municipalities which have already completed their new assessment will use this figure while centres such as Georgetown and Esqueving will be asked to submit an estimate of what the new figure will be. Costs will then be shared on this basis for 1950 and next year adjustments will be made. Should a municipality under-estimate it will have to take a larger share next year, and should it over-estimate, it will receive a rebate next year.

This plan must be approved by the various councils affected before it is finally adopted.

80 GALLONS OF GAS EXPLODE IN BLAZE

A blazing inferno, this truck caught fire at Crewson's Corners on Number 7 Highway outside of Rockwood on May 20. The Toronto Daily Star truck driver, Stan Tiley of Toronto, attempted to extinguish the inferno but his efforts were hopeless and the Rockwood and Acton fire brigades were called. 80 gallons of gasoline carried on the truck exploded as the picture was taken.

Six heavy steers and the driver of a truck narrowly escaped serious injury when the truck turned over in the ditch about one mile east of Campbellville on the Campbellville road about 7.45 a.m. Monday.

Driver of the truck, Andrew Shea of R. R. 1, Milton, told Provincial Police that he was headed in an easterly direction on the road and while rounding a sharp curve the heavy load of stock shifted and upset the truck.

The upset vehicle dumped its six bovine passengers, out into the ditch unharmed and Shea himself crawled out of the cab uninjured. The truck was damaged between \$300 and \$400, Provincial Police said.

Mr. Shea was taking his recently purchased load of steers to a slaughterhouse in Milton.

In Milton, there is a law which says an owner must license his dog and must then not allow him to run at large during certain months of the year.

As results of complaints, town officials explain, several summonses have been issued against dog owners for not having them licensed as well as allowing them to run at large. All have paid fines, some totalling as much as nine dollars.

According to an announcement made by Chief of Police Hugh Warrington early this week, owners of dogs found not to be adhering to the laws of the town will be prosecuted. He further advised those who do not have their pets licensed, to procure them at once to avoid further embarrassment.

Besides being a pet of the family, the dog affords a person companionship, but then one which roams around from yard to yard is one which lacks training and that type is not a good dog. Whether man comes home from his labors dead tired or sits in his favorite chair steeped in worries, it is the family pet which quietly saunters up and snuggles his cold, wet nose under a hand or arm, in his mute and quiet way, offering sympathy.

Is this appreciation not worth, to the master, some recognition other than just feeding him? To most, it is not the monetary value of the licence but the inconvenience which often prevents a person going to the municipal offices for their yearly tag.
