SUNDAY, JUNE 11th, 1950

THE NEED FOR REPENTANCE Golden Text-Seek ye the Lord all ye meek of the earth, that have kept his ordinances; seek righteousness, seek meekness: it may be ye LESSON TEXT.—Zeph. 1:12-18;

EXPOSITION. - 1. Punishment

Zephaniah is a prophet who forced the destruction of Judah and Jerusalem by the Chaldeans. He preceded Jeremiah (Jer. 16:16-18) taken into captivity. His misson was that of a flaming evangelist, awakening concern among the people by under consideration come at the conclusion of a serious indictment which fills all of Chapter 1. The message is a mingling of warning denunciation and proclamation of "the great day of the Lord" (v. 15). In vs. 12, 13 there is a solemn warning against those who assume that they can sin with impunity. These are those who brazenly refuse to accept the idea that they have responsibility toward God, who take the silent heavens as indicating that "the Lord will not do good, neither will he do evil" (v. 12b). God's judgments are not less certain because delayed (Ezek. 33: the judgments of the Lord are true and righteous altogether (Ps. 19:9-11). It is not to be understood that what is now taking place in Palestine is any such restoration. It is but a prelude, an imitation of prophecy without the life of God manifested in Israel of this day. Many sorrows are yet in store for unrepenting Israel.
