





4. Blanching of peaches and simlar fruit is necessary to remove skins. It is advisable when packaging peaches and pears to use 4 tsp. citric acid in the syrup to prevent discoloration.

5. Strawberries hold their shape and do not float in syrup if they are left to soak in syrup overnight before packaging—the same holds true in canning strawberries.

6. Fruit juice, raw or cooked, keeps frozen in quart or pint jars providing one inch of head space is left before placing on the rubber band, glass top and screw band. in the same size cartons.




