### Obituary

#### Esquering Resident John Stark Passes

A life long resident of Esquering Township, John Stark, the sixth son of the late Abraham and Mary Stark, passed away suddenly at his home Wednesday, July 12th. He was in his 77th year and a member of Boston Presbyterian Church. He leaves to mourn two sisters, Mabel at home and (Mary Ellen) Mrs. J. Neilson, Peru.

Funeral services were held from his late residence on Friday, July 14th conducted by Rev. H. Ferris of Milton. Interment was in Boston Church Cemetery.

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### Antiquities in Bengal Discovered

Antiquities of artistic and archaeological significance have been found in the bed of an old tank known as "Rani Dighi" (Queen's Tank) in Mainapore, district in the West Bengal. The antiquities which are considered to be 700 years old include small pedestals finely carved in bluish stone supporting figures of tortoise which represents the religious cult of sun worship prevalent in ancient times in West Bengal and Orissa.

A gold coin found along with the antiquities is considered to belong to the 13th century.

Another archaeological discovery has been made in Uttar Pradesh when the remains of an ancient glass factory have been unearthed in the old bed of the Adami River near Kopia. One of the moulds appears to have been the manufacturing centre of glass beads and glass bangles. Specimens of glass in all stages of manufacture have been found.

### Annual Flowers for the Farm Home

Annual flowers in a wide range of form and colour are an abundant source of enjoyment and provide relaxation for the rural dweller and at the Experimental Station Beaverlodge, Alta., an effort has been made to select those varieties possessing hardness and earliness.

While primarily designed for areas having short growing seasons, the varieties recommended may prove valuable to many interested in beautifying the home grounds.

Annual flowers are usually divided into three classes, namely edging, bedding and background types. Sweet alyssum, lobelia and dwarf petunias make satisfactory edging plants, as does the new dwarf, base-branching, Kirkwei aster.

### Most Important Speech

Unexpected, unannounced, Georges Villiers, president of all the employers of France, rose at the close of one of the early meetings of the Moral Re-Armament Conference at Caux, Switzerland, and asked to have the floor. Then he gave the talk which we quote in brief. "Yesterday I lunched next to a German union leader. He said that we should be enemies for two reasons. He was German and I was French; he was the union leader while I was the leader of the employers. I replied to him, 'We should be enemies for a third reason. I was condemned to death by the people of your country; I was a political prisoner; I saw nearly all of my comrades die around me. But all that is in the past. We must forget it, and I simply want to offer you my hand.'"

"I want to say how happy I am to have had the contacts with German leadership here which have been made possible by Moral Re-Armament. And now I shall say a word to the members of the worker's union. I hope, and hope with all my heart, that at some time not too far distant we shall be able to bring together at Caux, thanks to Moral Re-Armament, the leaders of the worker's unions and the leaders of the employers of the different countries of Europe, and that together we can think through the different problems which have divided us."

"Formulas and definitions will never solve human problems if the heart is not there. The thing we must find together is a new spirit. Then with one heart and shoulder to shoulder, employers and workers we will work at Caux for the reconstruction of Europe in the certainty that this united Europe will be the best guarantee of world peace."

Experience at Beaverlodge has shown that certain varieties should be seeded indoors and transplanted and these include the lobelia, petunia, snapdragon, China aster, Ten Weeks stock, marigold, pansy, burning bush, flowering tobacco, zinnia and salvia. Varieties which may be seeded out-of-doors if desired are sweet alyssum, pot marigold, California poppy, candytuft, mignonette and sweet pea.

Suitable background annual flower types are the sweet pea, burning bush, zinnia (tender) and flowering tobacco (N. affinis), this last being included primarily for its fragrance, as are also the old fashioned mignonette and the night-scented stock among the bedding plants.

### Bell Telephone Co. Announce Increase

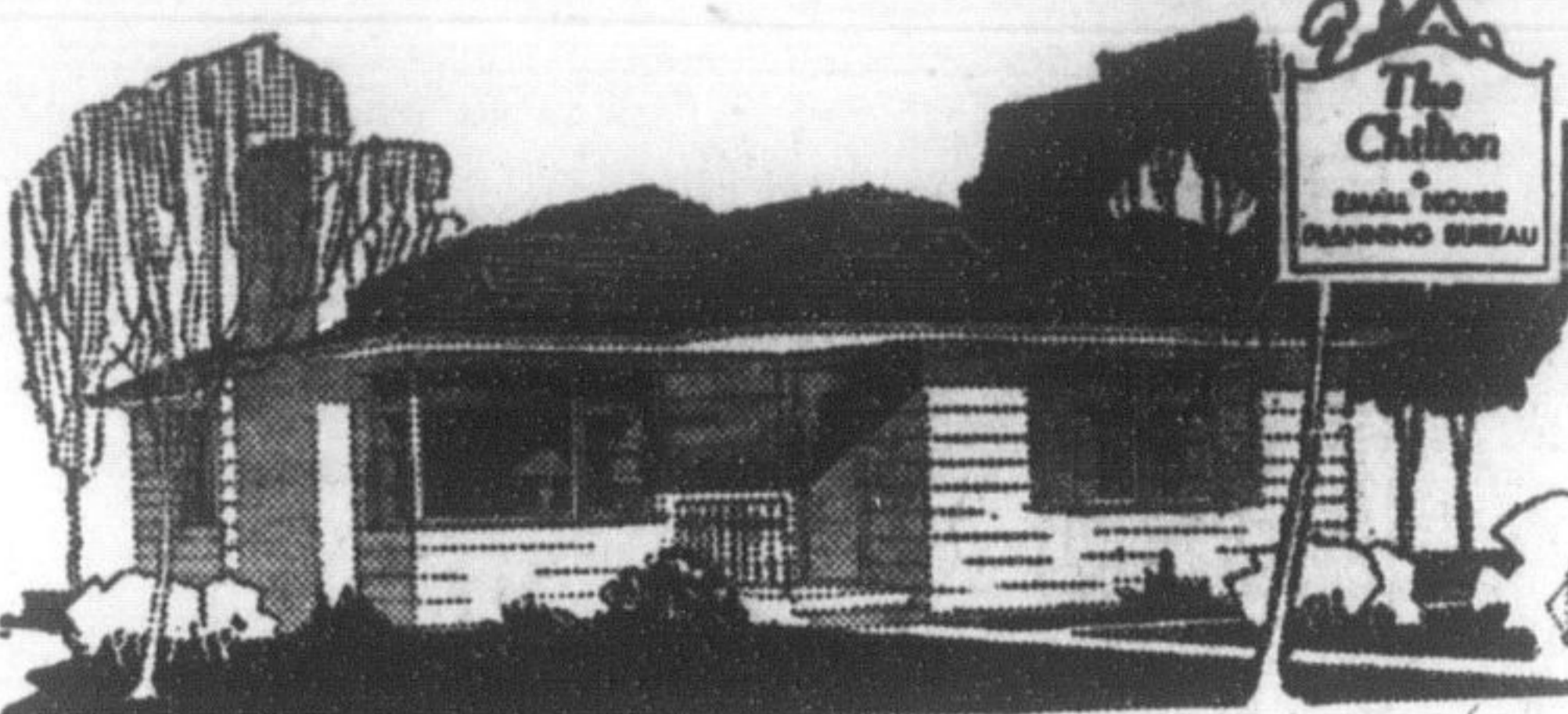

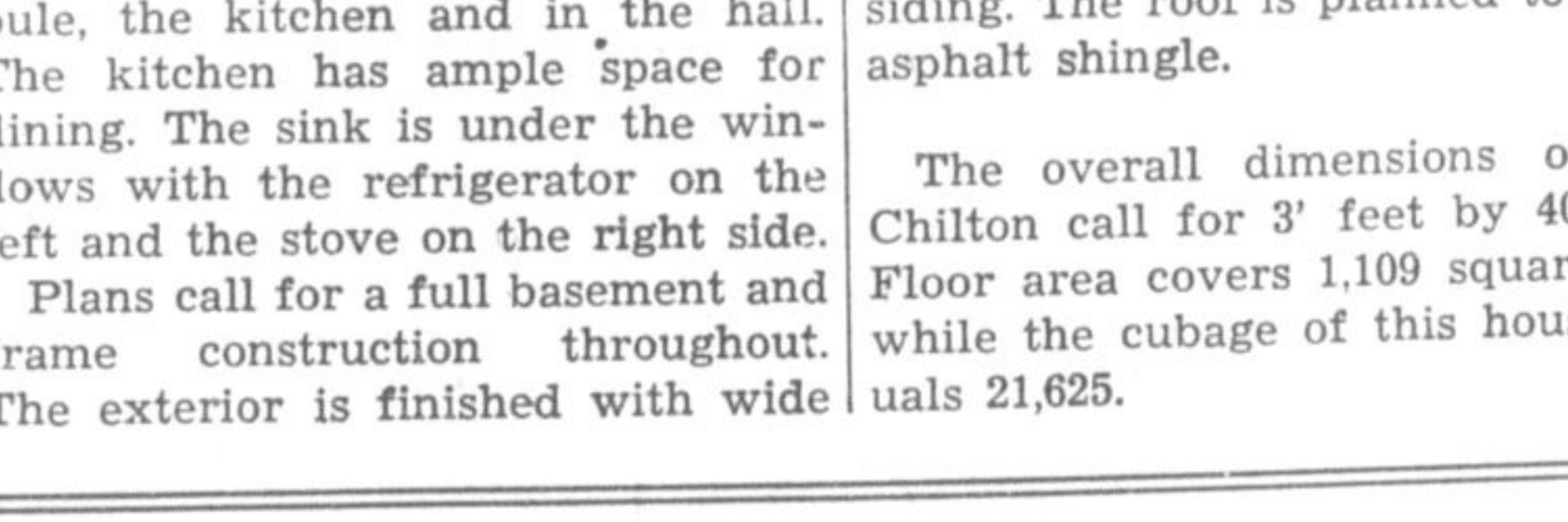

### THE CHILTON has three bedrooms that are arranged so that the front bedroom may be used as a workroom, office or den. This bedroom has an adjoining lavatory and closet and can be reached from both the kitchen and front entrance. The other two bedrooms open into the hall from which the bedrooms can also be reached.

The bedrooms have wardrobe type closets, the linen closet is in the bedroom hall and there are closets in the front vestibule, the kitchen and in the hall. The kitchen has ample space for dining. The sink is under the windows with the refrigerator on the left and the stove on the right side. Plans call for a full basement and frame construction throughout. The exterior is finished with wide siding. The roof is planned to be of asphalt shingle.

The overall dimensions of the Chilton call for 3' feet by 40 feet. Floor area covers 1,109 square feet while the cubage of this house equals 21,625.

### The Victor and the Spoils Belong

The late Scott Fitzgerald, the literary wonder-boy of the 20's, once coined an apt phrase: "The victor belongs to the spoils." We remember this when we read, day-by-day, of this labour victory or that. We cannot be too surprised when, in the exuberance of a successful negotiation, labor leaders speak of a settled strike as a labor victory. There is no such excuse for the public or press in so thinking. More often than not it is a Pyrrhic victory, a victory far more costly than defeat, and the victor is indeed a part of the spoils.

These victories of which the costs run into tens and hundreds of millions are costly victories indeed. How many years must pass before the lost savings of the worker are recouped, or the little businesses that depend on the worker's custom get back to normal? How much is gain when not only the worker who secures this Pyrrhic victory, but the worker who doesn't must pay more for the goods produced? And yet we go on blandly talking of victory. How many real victories have there been, in these past years, when all the costs are in?

It is understandable that labor's leaders, facing the fact that labor's strike gains are lost before before they are achieved, should look for a scapegoat. They assume that all demands can be paid out of profits, and that where costs increase it is due to the avarice of industry. They have almost succeeded in convincing themselves that this is so. But surely not the rest of us. A little careful thought would fully demonstrate that an increase of say, ten per cent in wages or equivalent costs would wipe out profits and the industry and the jobs with them. So the victory can be given a shadow of substance only where the public comes along to foot the bill in added costs.

The victory that nobody talks about, the real and tangible victory that has been responsible for most of the progress of our day, and most of the growing advantages that labour has enjoyed, springs not from conflict but from co-operation, where growing technical improvements provided by industry are used by labor to increase production, and so reduce prices. These are victories that no one talks about, but they are real and tangible victories, for nobody suffers and everybody gains. The wage gains of the past century have been the result of capital using the skill of management to develop industries that provide jobs in which the worker, increasing his effort by use of improving tools, can increase his production and so reduce prices and enlarge demand. This is the triumvirate of real progress, capital and industry and workers. There can be no victory of one over the other. All must win or all must lose. Otherwise the individual victor is only part of the spoils.

### A SHIRT TALE

A Toronto laundry found itself in an embarrassing position recently.

They are using a laundry tag with a number printed on it which is fastened to each piece of laundry to identify the owner. On shirts, these small tabs are usually pinned to the shirt-tail.

On a recent week-end they found themselves with about two thousand shirts on hand, estimated from about five hundred customers, and that many of the tags were so bleached as to make them most difficult to identify.
