**Council Opposes Building School**  
 (Continued from Page One)

Mr. Robert McKim and Mr. Charles Kerr of the Public School Board were present to discuss with council the carrying on of the kindergarten class in the town hall. Among the facts brought out by the members of the Board were that the Jackson property had been purchased but Inspector Skuce had condemned the buildings for use as class rooms. The Inspector had stated that he would pass the room in the town hall for the present term but that the room would not be large enough for next year.

Principal Foster had had a survey made and it showed that more would be ready for kindergarten next year and more would turn up for class if the School Board takes over. The Board members have considered providing more accommodation but feel that the only proper solution is a new school.

The Board felt they should wait for a decision to be made till after the High School District makes a decision as to the location of the central school.

The council felt that they should leave the education to the School Board and the members of the Board agreed it was their responsibility.

Last year the kindergarten cost the taxpayers about \$800. If the School Board took over it would mean a teacher at \$1900 and other expenditures totalling \$2800. It is expected that the grant would be 55 per cent of the expenditure or \$1200 from taxes.

Various councillors expressed their private opinions on the question of continuing the kindergarten classes and since the School Board was unwilling to carry on the kindergarten at present, the council felt that they should carry on until next June.

A vote of the Councillors was taken and the Council voted in favour of taking on the task until next June. A by-law is to be prepared to this effect.

An estimate for laying a new water main and storm sewer on the south side of Main Street was tabled. This estimate was supplied by Engineer Roy Smith. The cost of the water main is estimated at \$5,577. A 12 and 15 inch concrete storm drain is to be laid in the same trench at a cost of \$6,841. The total cost of this renewal is estimated at \$12,418. Council felt this job should be done this fall if possible but where the money is coming from was the contentious question. The auditor is to be asked to give an answer on how the town can finance this expenditure this year. The council will hold a special meeting as soon as possible for this project to be finished this year.

A recommendation of the Fire, Light and Police was made, that a new street light be installed on Thomas Street between Sarah and Garnet. This light was ordered to be installed and the Hydro Commission be so notified.

A letter was read stating that National Fire Prevention Week was being held next week. The Fire Committee is to take this matter up with the Fire Chief.

The Fire, Light and Police Com-

mittee was to take up the supplying of police uniforms and bring in a recommendation at the next meeting.

The I.O.D.E. requested that consideration be given to a rebate for the rent of the hall. This was for the Hobby Show recently held. The proceeds of this show are used mainly for local projects. The usual rebate was passed for this organization.

Deputy-Reeve Holdsworth gave a report on the water being shut off during the week-end in the east section of the town. The new pipe was being laid and a pipe had been cracked. The end plug and a piece of pipe had also let go. A claim is to be put in to the pipe company for the split pipe. Instructions were to be issued so that if any emergencies arise everything possible will be done to get the water pressure back on the mains.

The Canadian March of Dimes organization had a letter presented requesting that an organization be set up in Milton. The per capita assessment is 10 cents.

Letters were read from Oakville and Burlington on the inquiry re the building of an incinerator. Burlington do not contemplate building an incinerator. Oakville held a meeting last week on the matter but no member of Council was present.

The tenth report of the Groves Construction Co. was passed. The amount for lateral installation was \$3,157.00.

An account for the fences around the sewer plant was passed for \$1013.20.

Councillor Whewell gave a resume of the civil defense layout as proposed by the Dominion-Provincial Conference. The idea behind this civil defense organization is to have someone in authority in case of an emergency coming up. The Council decided to set up a committee to handle this leadership.

The Clerk reported that the survey of the MacNab lot on Robert Street had been sent to Mr. Bowman for plans to be forwarded to Council.

Councillor Anderson brought up the matter of speeding on the streets about town. This matter is to be brought to the attention of the police. Signs are to be procured and erected.

Mr. Lucie had been speaking to Councillor Thompson on procuring an entrance to his place on Sidney Street. Council issued instructions that a tile be installed and gravelled for a walk across the road and other places about town.

Instructions were issued for the men to go about town and clean the mud off the sidewalks which has been on since the sewer installations.

The Cubs asked permission to use the Town Hall on Monday evenings. They also requested permission to hold an apple day on Saturday, October 21st. This permission was granted.

An inquiry had been made by the new owners of the Climax Chemical building in regard to permits etc. Council understands that the firm will manufacture wood excelsior and employ five men to start. The building is to be taken over immediately.
