

### Water Cost Out of Town is Censured

mittee, reported that the committee recommended the acceptance of the tender of H. Fay for the installation of a toilet and wash basin in the Town Hall. The new equipment will be installed in the washroom just off the council chamber and the equipment at present there will be installed in a room on the second floor of the building.

The by-law to provide for the management and regulation of the municipal waterworks system was read a second time on the motion of Norris and Ezeard. Councillor Anderson and Councillor Whewell made the motion for the third reading. The by-law, numbered 897, incorporates in it the increased rates for the waterworks system.

A surveying account of E. P. Bowman amounting to \$35 was to be paid by the special sewer account on motion of Whewell and Anderson. The account of E. Groves on certificate No. 10 amounting to \$2086 was to be paid from the special sewer account also. The council has a hold-back of \$8023 on the work performed by the company.

Councillor Thompson reported on a meeting of the Fire, Light and Police Committee. A detailed report had been received from the Chief of Police. As a result of the meeting, the committee made recommendations for consideration by the council. It was suggested that an annual clothing allowance of \$100 be paid to all full time members of the Police Department at the completion of 12 months' service. One additional revolver was recommended to be purchased in order that all members of the force would be armed when the three members are on duty at the same time. Necessary forms and record books were to be secured. The report also recommended that consideration be given to hiring a third full time man for the Police Department.

In order to improve the street lighting in Milton, Council decided to begin by increasing the lighting on Martin and Woodward Sts. Eleven 200 watt lights will be installed on each street. The lighting of the public parking lot at the Legion is to be investigated and increased.

The Waterworks Committee reported that Mr. Argo of Gore and Storrie had been in town investigating the water supply and had located a large amount of water. It is expected a result of the survey will be sent from the Toronto office shortly. Mr. Barton was instructed to report to council on the extension of additional sewer laterals on Mill St.

On motion of Reeve Dick and Councillor McNab, the clerk was instructed to write a letter of appreciation to the local branch of the Legion, thanking them for their community-minded spirit in opening a public parking lot.

County Engineer Roy Smith was instructed by motion to proceed to call for tenders for laying a storm sewer and water main on the south side of Main St. with the tenders to be submitted to council.

A letter is to be sent to the municipal engineer of the Department requesting an additional road subsidy for the town of Milton. The original subsidy of \$5000 has already been used and it will be necessary to secure additional assistance to maintain the streets for the remainder of the year. The council is also requesting the Department of Highways to pave Highway 25 right through Milton to the southern boundary.

A by-law will be introduced at the next regular meeting of council to arrange for the annual nomination meeting and if necessary, the election for members to the Municipal Council, the Hydro Commission and the Public School Board. The nominations will be held on the last Friday before the last Monday (October 27th) as set out by a previous by-law.

Mr. Alf Barton is to be requested to take on the position as town foreman on October 30. Mr. Harry Coulson will, after that date, be in charge of the town hall, the three sewage pumping stations and the sewage disposal plant.

Claims for damages to automobiles as a result of accident caused by sinking of the roadway after the installation of sewer laterals were received. The total claims amounted to \$19.65 and were to be forwarded to the insurance company for settlement.

Apparently some culprit has made off with the Mayor's gavel which has caused a certain amount of confusion at the meetings. To call the meeting to order, the mayor had to resort to striking an ash tray with an old door knob. While this method was none the less effective, it lacked a certain dignity associated with the Mayor. We are sure that if the said culprit would return His Worship's symbol of office the said Mayor would be very happy.

Council adjourned at 1 a.m. without the gavel—or door knob.

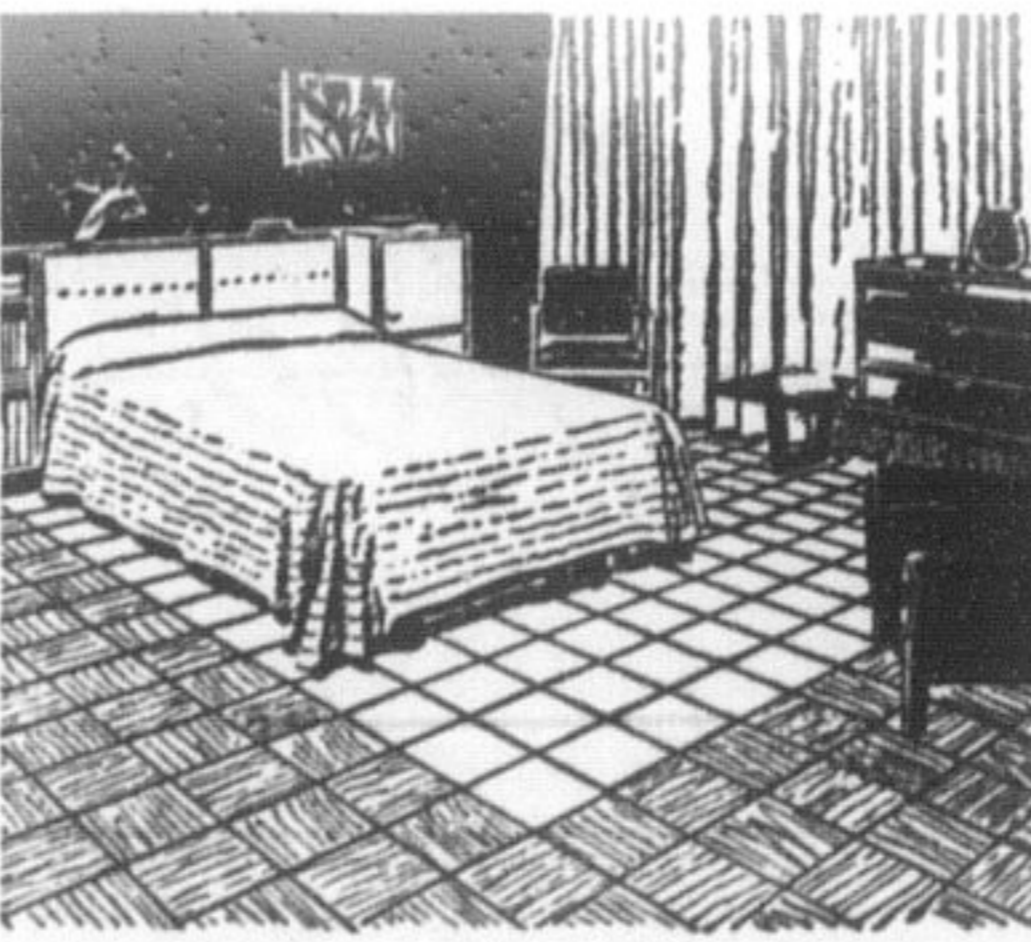
