Trees, Ladders, Etc. In Unique Hospital

The only one of its kind in North America is the Malton Convalescent Hospital, of the Ontario Workmen's Compensation Board, for here in the hospital rooms, one finds railway tracks, tree trunks growing from the floor, a boxcar ladder bolted to one wall. What for? Everything in this unique hospital serves a useful purpose and most of its patients leave ready for the jobs they left when they were injured.

Ian Campbell, superintendent, rates the centre as a model and guide of its kind. Observers have arrived at Malton from such distant points as Hong Kong and there are many American doctors and therapists serving on the staff who will leave to return to the U.S. with their new-found know-

Under the Workmen's Compensation Act costs of accident prevention and remedial treament are borne by the industries concerned. Industrial accidents injured 180,000 persons in Ontario in 1948 as compared to only 40,000 in 1921, yet in 1948 only 2,000 were permanently disabled as compared to 3,000 in 1921. This, says Mr. Campbell, is the reason for the world-wide interest in the Malton centre.

Walking through the corridors of any of the 15 buildings in the therapy wings, you see such sights as a young brakeman, learning to climb a boxcar ladder, after he injured both knees in a railway accident last winter. Another crew is laying a complete set of rails in one of the dormatories where all railmen injured at their jobs. are taking therapeutic treatment under surveillance to refit them for their old jobs.

Two young bushmen from Cochrane are deadly serious about their jobs of sawing through a threefoot tree stump, while a milkman practices loading milk cases on the back of a mockup milk truck. Every recreation is carefully planned so that even while resting or relaxing the patients are fitting themselves for the return to work. Billiard tables to loosen up stiff arms; darts and horseshoes for wrist movement, ping pong and bowling for leg and foot cases are all part of the general back-to-work theme of the hospital. Living conditions are of the best and every man is sure everything is being done to send him back to work in the pink of condition.
