10 Commandments Hunters' "Musts"

The ten commandments of hunting sound so reasonable that many district hunters perhaps consider them not worth repeating. For safety first, though, these rules should never be forgotten by anyone carrying a gun.

1. Every gun is loaded until you, yourself, have unloaded it.
2. Never carry a loaded gun. Remove the bolt or take down the mechanism.
3. Be sure that nothing is stuck in the barrel—mud, dirt or a clot of grease.
4. Carry the gun so the muzzle is always under control, even if you fall.
5. Make sure you can distinguish your target before you fire. Know what it is. See it.
6. Never point a gun in fun, never except at something you want to shoot.
7. Never leave any loaded gun unattended.
8. Never climb a fence or tree with a loaded gun.
9. Never shoot at hard flat surfaces or at water.
10. Never mix horse-play and gun-powder.

Reason Oaks Shed Leaves Last Told

Why do oaks shed their leaves last? Oaks are usually the last trees in the forest to shed their leaves in the fall. Frequently the leaves of this species remain on the trees all winter.

This is supposed to be due to the fact that in oaks, as well as in a few other species of trees, growth has not entirely ceased when frost arrives. A sudden drop in temperature stops growth when the fibrovascular bundles or woody fibre connecting the leaves with the twigs are still in a vegetative condition. In other words, the natural partition usually preceding the falling of leaves has not taken place. The connecting fibres that have been suddenly killed by frost become hard and tough and consequently the leaves sometimes cling to the twigs until the next spring when they are shed largely through the action of wind and rain.

No Immediate Rise In Taxes Forseen

Despite the warning of higher taxes by Graham Towers of the Bank of Canada, The Financial Post's Ottawa correspondent doesn't think there is much chance of any immediate and substantial raise. Government revenues, he points out, are pretty high in any case. He writes: "There's no disposition here as yet to budget for surpluses merely to reduce inflationary pressures. It's argued that balancing the government accounts (plus perhaps a small surplus) is all the traffic will bear—politically. Definitely there'll be no special or confiscatory taxes just to achieve the over-all objective of cutting inflationary pressures."

The Government got its fill of that in 1947-48; won't easily tangle with that hornet nest again.
