



Halton Night School Off to a Splendid Start

Three hundred folk were in attendance on Tuesday evening of last week for the opening of the Night classes being held in Milton. Courses are being given in Farm Business, Farm Machinery, Woodworking, Elementary Clothing, Advanced Dressmaking, Tailoring, Choral Singing, Leathercraft, Effective Speaking, and Oil Painting. The response to the announcement sent out in October was far greater than anyone ever anticipated. The closing date for applications was Nov. 1st, when 312 folk both rural and urban, from all sections of the County, had made application, for some one of the courses offered. We are informed by A. T. Woodley, Chairman of the Committee in charge, that due to lack of accommodation it has not been possible to accept many other applications which have come forward since that date. Eight of the courses are being held at the Milton High School, and some 90 ladies participating in the Clothing and Tailoring Courses are holding forth in the Sunday School room of St. Paul's United Church and in the hall at the Farmer's Building. A staff of 15 has been secured from such points as Guelph, Hamilton, Dundas, Mimico, Toronto, and Milton district.

The committee in charge has had many problems with which to cope, and while some adjustments here and there will have to be made, it would appear that the majority of those enrolled are more than delighted with the opportunities which are being presented.

Halton Baby Bees Make Outstanding Showing at the Royal

Nine Halton Baby Beef Club members competed for the King's Guineas at the recent Royal Winter Fair. They were in competition with some one hundred and eighty club members from all sections of the Province. Judge Chas. Yewell from Western Canada had his work more than cut out in selecting the top. In the Shorthorn section with over eighty steers in competition no less than five out of seven Halton entries were in the first class group. Heading the line was the entry of Judy Merry of Oakville and in second place was Sandy Buchanan of Moffat—a great achievement for Halton Baby Beef Club Members. The entry of Judy Merry was the runner up to the Angus steer which was awarded the King's Guineas. The King's Guineas winner sold at \$2.00 per pound and the reserve at \$1.00 per pound.

Miss Course will now represent Halton Juniors in the Provincial Competition to be held in Toronto early in the year. The amateur entertainment brought together entries from Brookville, Milton, Norval and Palermo. Miss Edith Donklyn of Burlington was the able adjudicator in this branch of the evening's programme. Palermo Juniors directed by Geo. S. Atkins, presented the winning skit entitled "S. S. Bermuda". The skit was written for the occasion by Mr. Atkins and was declared by many to be at least the equal if not superior to their winning skit of a year ago which received much commendation wherever presented. PRUSSIAN FIRE LAWS

The following excerpts from a proclamation of King Frederick, dated December 3, 1775, shows that the forest laws for East Prussia were quite severe.

"Anyone starting a fire in or within 100 paces of a forest, or using a pitch torch or any fire when fishing or catching crawfish in any lakes and on streams or creeks flowing through a forest, or who smokes tobacco during the dry or summer season within a forest, even though no damage is done, shall be punished with a four-week jail or penitentiary sentence and, if any damage results, shall pay such damage; if he can not pay the damage, the period of imprisonment shall be in proportion to the amount of damage ascertained, up to 100 thaler, one-fourth year, from 100 to 200 thaler, one-half year, and 200 thaler and over, 1 year imprisonment."

Conditions For Doctors and Dentists Are Found Fairly Satisfactory In the County

"What has happened to the country doctor?" This was the topic for discussion for the first meeting of the second series of Farm Forum Radio broadcasts held Monday, Nov. 27 and it is interesting to note that out of 15 reports received from Halton Forums practically all were agreed on the first question which read as follows: "Are the Medical services in your community adequate in regard to Doctors?" Mt. Nemo Forum was the only Forum which said there should be more Doctors, as rural communities are so scattered.

In regard to adequate nursing services, all agreed that there was a great scarcity of nursing services, except Bell's Forum which is located close to Milton. Several suggestions were given to rectify this condition, by making training of nurses more attractive with higher pay and shorter training period. V.O.N. nursing services were also suggested.

In regard to adequate hospital services, eight Forums report hospitals are adequate, while the remainder felt they were very inadequate. Zimmerman suggested a County Hospital with 25 beds.

In regard to dental services, four Forums were agreed that dentists were adequate, while the remainder felt they were very inadequate and suggested that relief assistants were badly needed.

The second question was what factors in your community at present would be likely to discourage a Doctor from practising there?" Some said the twenty-four hour duty without relief and the unavoidable winter road conditions in some parts. The majority thought that there was not anything to discourage a doctor taking up practice in this locality, due to the fact that

we have a Halton Co-operative Medical service.

As to what should be done to make it more attractive for a doctor, it was thought more ready assistance could be given during the wintry weather to help the doctor reach his destination. Improved telephone service, and last but by no means least, a prepaid medical and sickness policy would encourage a doctor. Bell's Forum suggested paving Milton main street.

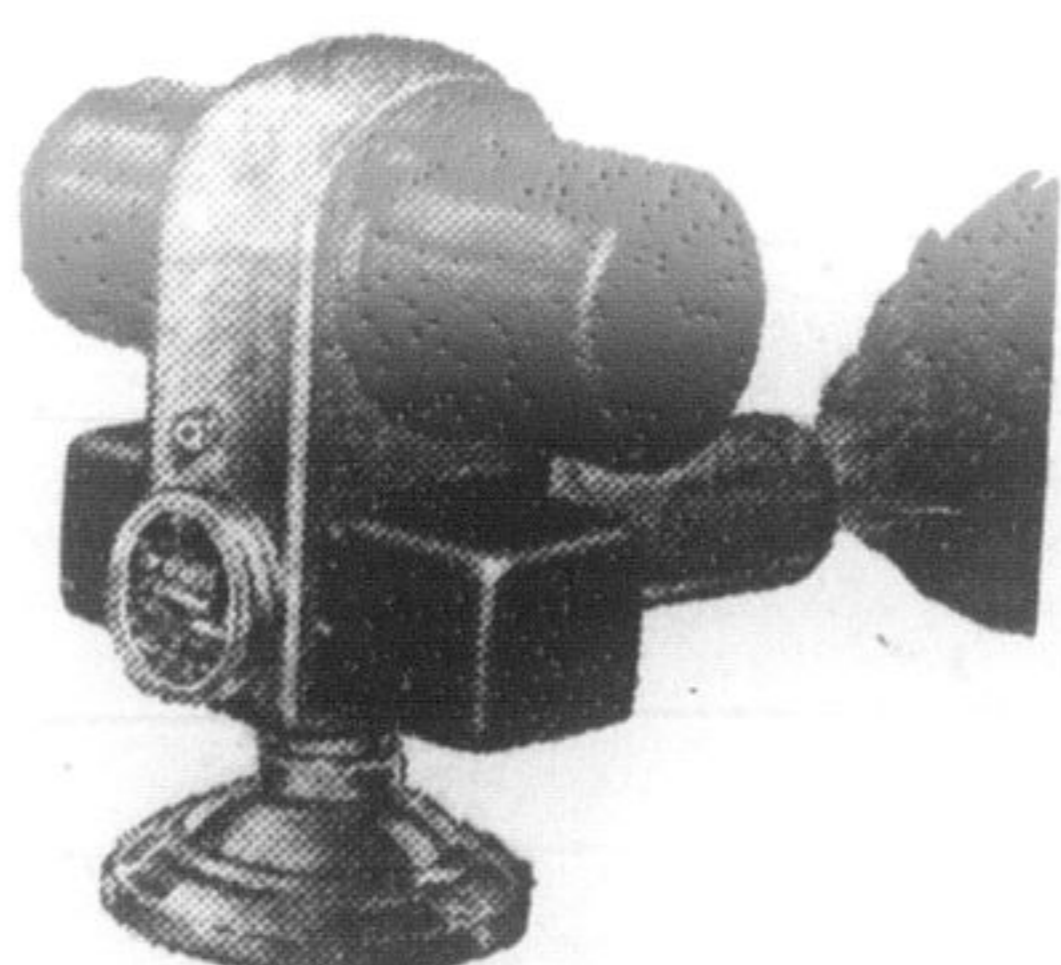
