## Third Period Rally Takes Game Against Burlington

Milton pulled out a win on Monday night against Burlington with a rousing ten minute rally in the third period when they scored the tying and winning goals. This was the only highlight in a rugged game of hockey.

If the Co-ops are to carry Milton colors into and through the playoffs, they will have to settle down and play hockey. Their passing was bad due to men being out of position and the defence at times were woefully slow and weak. Perhaps they just got a bad game out of their systems. With some more coaching, their faults could be corrected—then watch them go.

Burlington had plenty of speed and tested Evans at 11 seconds, then Russ Hann scored at 35 seconds. Milton could not get untracked though Hipel and Linton missed on golf shots. On the one real chance Milton had, Hipel was offside.

Cartwright missed the open net after drawing Evans out. The Fox, Melanson, Grenke line had good opportunities but Wellbourne covered each time. With Hann off for fighting, Milton applied the pressure and Wellbourne was lucky on a shot from Fox.

Burlington scored Britt from Hutchinson at 6:38 on a break away. Evans pulled off a spectacular save seconds later on a shot from Hoyle.

At this stage, Milton defence were pitiful and Evans had plenty of work. At 9:43 Scilsizzi scored from Murdoch.

The goal seemed to liven up the Co-ops and Melanson, Fox and Grenke hemmed the Burl's behind their own blue line. On another break away Sullivan put the puck past Evans but it was called back for offside.

Then Grenke let J. Kentner through and he passed wildly instead of shooting. Fox missed as the bell went.

Milton took command at the start of the second and Hipel was twice through but could not finish. Evans was given a hot time for a few seconds as Milton defence fell apart again. Melanson, Murdoch and Grenke tested Wellbourne but the Burlington goalie was on the job.

During some very scarily skinny, Fox had three tries and missed. Burlington put another into the net which was called back for offside. Clancy did not like it and showed his displeasure by pounding the boards. Result, 10 minute misconduct.

Milton's power play was certainly lacking in power for Britt from Hann at 5:12 made it 3-1 for Burlington. Two minutes later it was 4-1 as Shepherd scored unassisted. Grenke got one back at 7:59.

Fox went off at 10:30 followed by Hann at 11:30 with neither team being able to do much.

The Co-ops got back into the game at 13:59 when Melanson took a pass from Binsell to make it 4-3 for Burlington. The play slowed and first Hann, then Binsell went off for boarding.

The third period was slow and the hockey was of the scramble variety though Evans was called on for a few saves. At the 9 minute mark, Milton came to life and Burlington had their hands full.

However, persistence paid off when Hipel tied the game at 10:31 on passes from Raine and Linton. Still continuing their pressure, Milton finally scored what proved the winning goal on a beautiful shot by Raine on a pass from Hipel at 17:35. Burlington applied pressure but the Co-ops held them off.

However, Milton took command again in the third period when they scored six goals with only a pair of replies from New Toronto.

Milton out-shot the visitors by a slight margin 43-35 but the New Torontonians were captains of the penalty box, drawing 6 penalties and a misconduct to Milton's three. Chard of New Toronto was the leading goal-getter of the night when he chucked up 4. Milton's Chuck Currie came second in the list with 3, followed by Grenke, J. Kentner and Melanson with 2 each.

Digby led the parade to the sin bin with 3 penalties and was awarded a 10 minute misconduct sentence in the second period when he chose to differ in opinion and expressed his version to the referees. MacKenzie of New Toronto was the only other player to report more than once to the penalty timers.

In the last minutes of the game, Huntley was hit on the nose with a stick and retired to the dressing room.

## Praise Warden At County Council

Glengarry, who were seeking to have the provincial government increase the Children's Aid Society grant from 25 percent to 50 percent and that grants to the Homes for the Aged be made to the county instead of the local municipalities, were endorsed by the members.

Council approved of a \$500 grant to both the Oakville-Trafalgar High School Board and the North Halton High School board to aid in the teaching of agriculture in those schools. Deputy-Reeve E. Eaton, Nelson, questioned the grant to these two school areas, asked if the Burlington-Nelson school was not entitled to it as well. It was explained the grant was statutory to schools teaching agriculture and that Burlington school did not teach that subject to students.

Appointments made to the various high school area boards for 1951 included, North Halton Board; N. L. Pickett, Col. G. O. Brown, and Dr. A. J. Buchanan, replacing G. A. Dills. Oakville-Trafalgar board, J. Caulder. Burlington-Nelson board, Ross Segsworth.

Dr. Mather declared that parents should take their children to the family doctor if a suspicious rash appears. "Children are pretty sick before the rash comes out and the measles take a fairly short course," he stated. The epidemic is fairly severe according to medical standards.

If we would not only learn but practice the golden rule a world at peace would be achieved. But peace must start in our own hearts.

It was a message that compelled thought and was spiced with illustration and humor that held the attention of all. On behalf of the audience, Judge Robinson expressed appreciation to Padre Young.

Mr. Hughes Cleaver, M.P. for Halton and Mr. Stanley Hall, member of the Ontario legislature for the county, spoke briefly.

Reeve George Currie of Esquesing, dean of county council, had the honor of toasting the Warden and making a presentation on behalf of county council of a beautiful chair. The endorsement of Warden VanSickle was spontaneous from band and audience when they sang lustily "For he's a jolly good fellow."

He briefly reviewed county council experiences and sounded a warning on the demand of people in spending public funds and brought to attention that all funds of all governments were the monies of the people.
