Use of modern machinery, good wages, board, regular hours, holidays with pay and entertainment for spare time and, if a good man, compensation. 2. Farm workers should have a union of their own to which they may, or may not, belong. The reason was that what is fair for an industrial worker should be fair for farm labor.

No. 6 Farm Forum of Kelso was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Mahon with Mr. Edward Parsons as group leader. The discussion on "Security for farm labor" ended in these decisions: 1. Good wages, hours, housing, an accident insurance similar to Workmen's Compensation. 2. Unions are not necessary among farm workers in Canada because, (a) scarcity of farm laborers gives the laborers a choice of jobs and wages without the union; (b) if farm unions got too strong a farmer would have to keep a hired man whether he was good or not; if farmers themselves were unionized the farm laborers could be, otherwise they would be in the labor union's power too much; (c) farmers cannot control the price of their produce, therefore, their income is uncertain and they cannot guarantee the hired help a definite wage or working conditions.

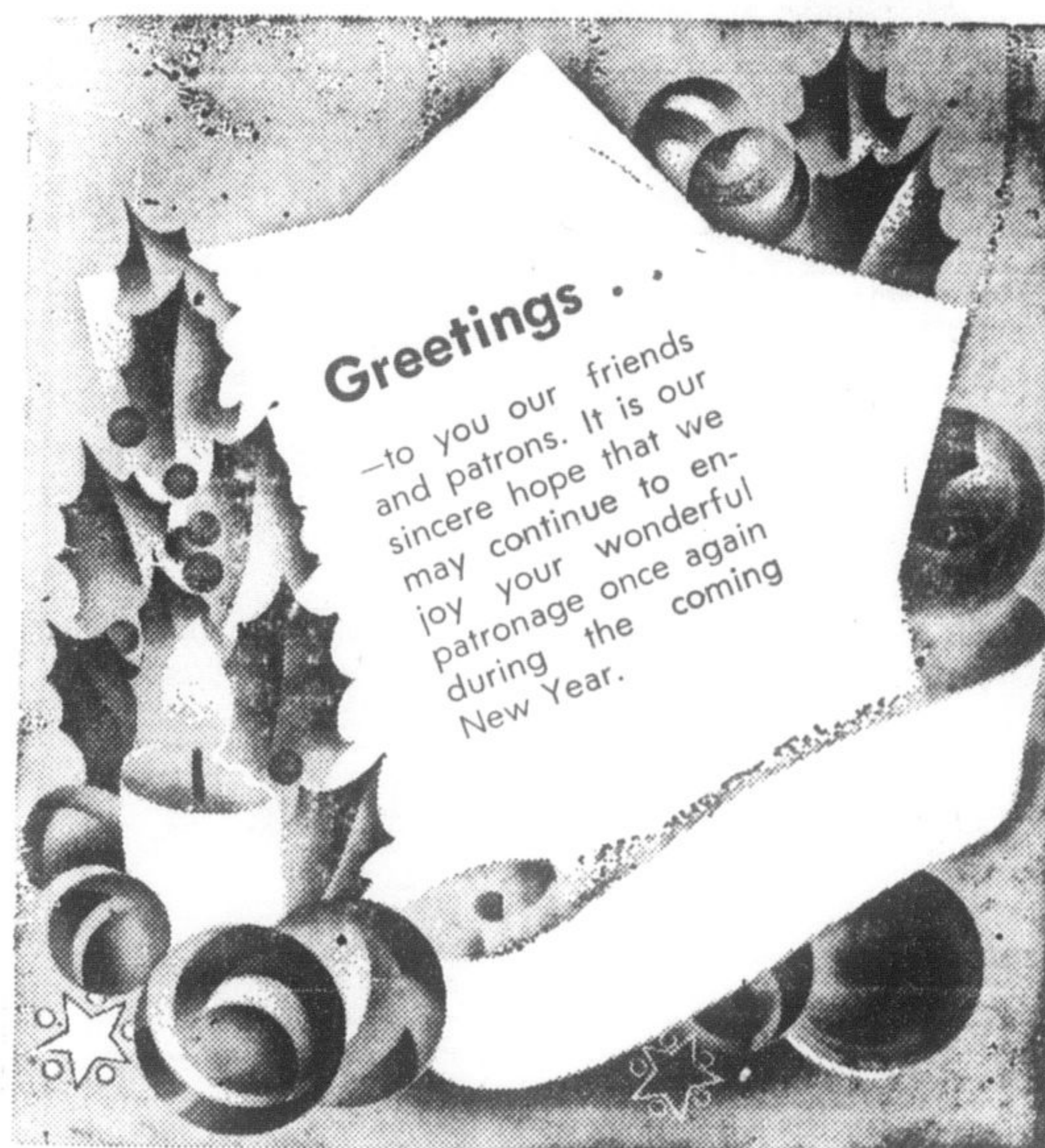
