### Forum Disagrees re Produce Markets

The Campbellville correspondent wishes the Canadian Champion and staff and readers a Happy and Prosperous New Year.

Mr. Edgar Stokes and Mr. Andy Quirie were leaders of discussion at No. 6 Farm Forum, Kelso, held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Neil Martin on Monday evening. The groups disagreed and discussion resulted as follows:

1. Advertising - sending out international agents to find or make markets for their produce.

2. Yes-If it is going to benefit the farmer in finding markets and better prices for their produce.

1. Members decided lower prices would increase the buyers' consumption but wages and machinery costs must lower accordingly.

2. No. Because the increase in profit from advertising will not equal the cost of advertising.

The lunch committee was composed of Mrs. Edward Parsons and Mrs. George Stokes.

Mr. Archie Cairns was chairman at No. 1 School Farm Forum on Monday evening when the topic for discussion was:

1. What do you think should be done to insure future markets for the surplus products in your area?

2. Do you think it is a good idea or not, for farm organizations to collect money from farmers for the purpose of promoting the sale of their products as the dairy farmers of Canada are doing with dairy products and give reasons.

Mr. Claude Inglis and Mr. Albert Stewart, group leaders, derived the following answers:

"We think we should bring in more immigrants to increase consumption of our products at home."

"We should have more control of margarine, put more duty on foreign oils used to make it, so it will compete with butter, or better still ban it altogether."

2. We think advertising would pay us well, in getting rid of the surplus. We think it is a good idea to take money from products to promote sales.

"Reason - The farmers are the ones who benefit from the sale of farm products, so we consider they have a right to help pay for promoting sale of some products."

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
