Installs Son Warden Of Halton County (Continued from Page One)

Council approved a by-law to borrow up to \$200,000 to meet the current expenditures during the year. The Roads Committee along with County Engineer R. F. Smith were chosen as delegates to attend the annual Good Roads Convention being held in Toronto next month.

Reeve Litchfield strongly criticized the Toronto Star for a press report in connection with the new Home for the Aged. He said the newspaper stated the county paid \$123,000 for the site on which the building is being erected. He felt this information was very misleading and would give the citizens of Halton the impression "we were throwing their money around."

He stated the county paid \$6,000 for the site instead of the \$123,000 as reported, and asked council to have the clerk write the newspaper seeking correction of the printed report. Mr. Litchfield told members he had been talking to the reporter but had not seen a correction printed to this date. Council approved of his suggestion.

A mutual aid fire protection in Halton was again brought to the attention of council by Deputy Reeve E. R. Lauder, Oakville. He asked members to consider the matter as he felt that such a scheme might come under civil defence program, and if the mutual aid did not exist, Halton might be placed with other counties forming a district. A committee will be appointed to investigate all angles of the question.

Reeve Ellenton spoke on the efforts of a committee in respect to the formation of a Fire Area surrounding Milton. He was sorry discussions had not continued, but felt he would like to see them renewed.

Reeve Joe Wickson told members he was quite in favour but thought the Christmas season had interfered with further talks. Deputy Reeve Geo. Leslie informed members Esquising had never had an area formed but were preparing such a move. Those in the southern portion of the township sought to have such an area created, he said.

Reeve Wickson again inquired of council what the intentions of the road committee were in regard to the removal of trees and shrubs at the curves opposite the Woodland Orchards on the second line between Palermo and Bronte.

He said that since he brought it to the attention of council last fall two more accidents had occurred there. He felt that if the trees and shrubs were removed it would help to eliminate some of the hazard there. "Some immediate action should be taken. I was wondering what the road committee had done or what they recommended following their inspection last month," he questioned.

Reeve Thorpe told members the inspection was made rather late in the year to make a report, but thought something will be done about the hazard at that point.

"The engineer was going to gather some men together and do some trimming down there, but has apparently done nothing about it", injected Reeve George Currie.

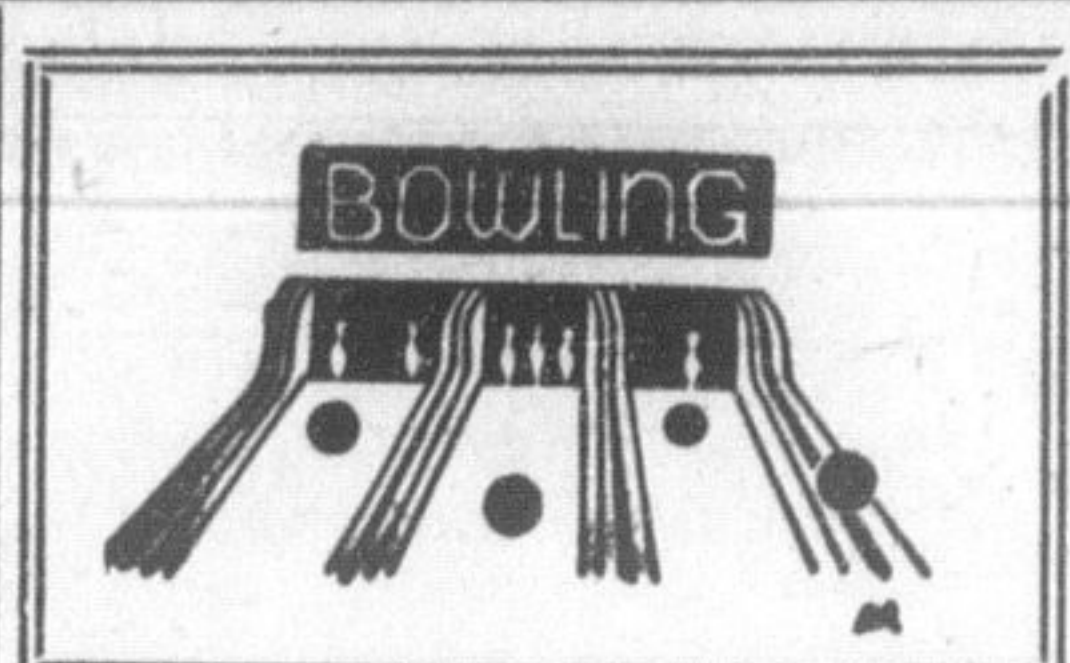
