It was recently announced that Cedric Harrop, Esquesing Township, Halton co-operator in the Cost of Hog Production Project, had an average of 82 per cent Grade A's during the past year. This is an outstanding achievement at any time. It is even more noteworthy when one realizes that Mr. Harrop markets well over 100 market hogs annually. The percentage of "Grade A" hogs marketed by Halton producers in 1905 was 42.3 percent. Incidentally, Halton was the second high county for grade 'A' hogs in the province last year. 


