\$200,000 SEWERAGE DEBENTURES SOLD

Council Accepts Proposal On Sewerage Debentures

Council sold \$200,000, half of the \$400,000 debenture issue, to Fry and Co. at a special meeting on Wednesday afternoon. The \$400,000 debenture issue is made up of \$36,600 to cover lateral installations, \$99,000 for the sewerage disposal plant, and \$264,000 for the actual sewerage installations.

Hail, Wind Strike, Trees Blown Down

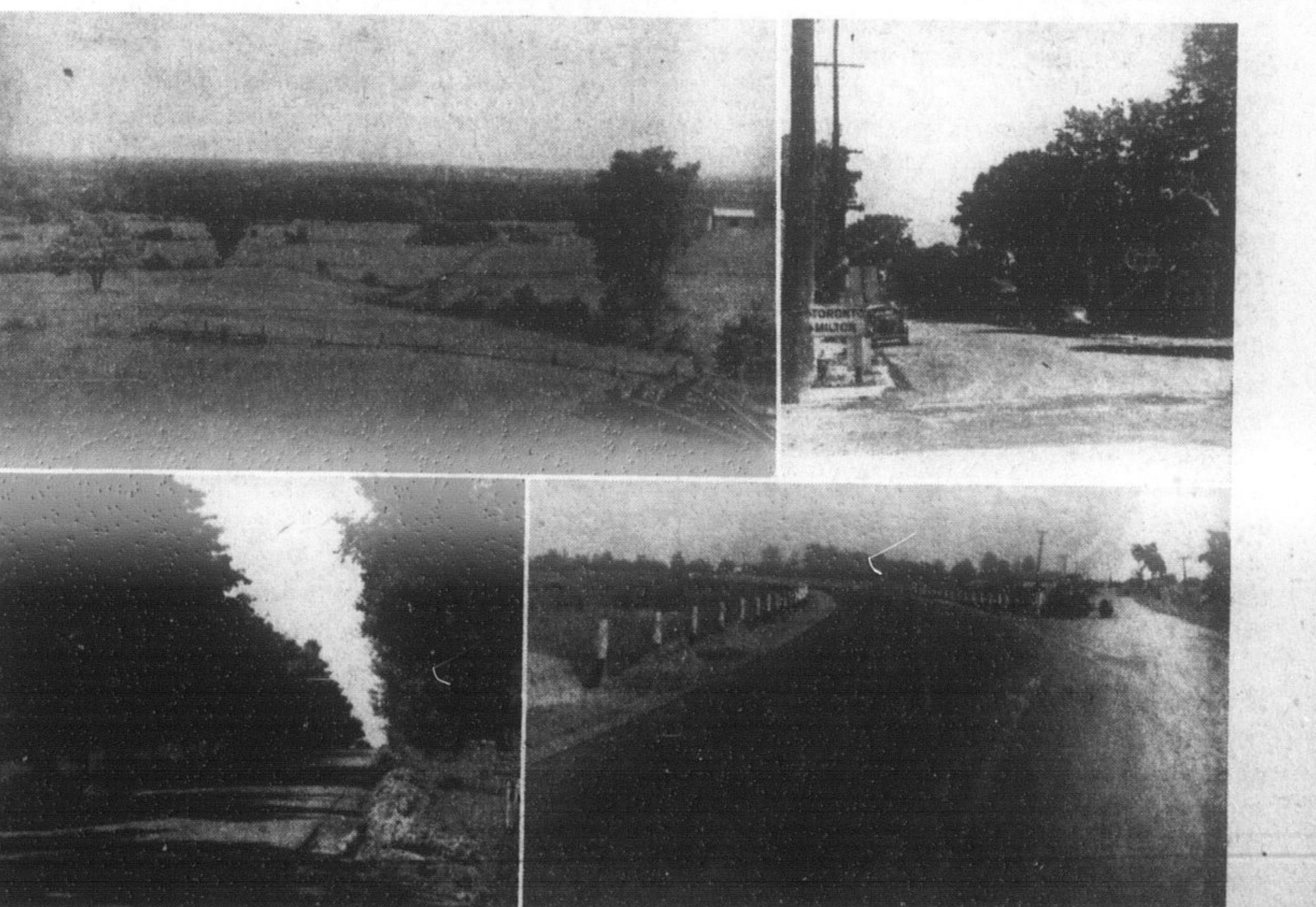
Trees were blown down and hydro and telephone service disrupted in part of the area surrounding Milton yesterday in what the weatherman thought might be a second twister.
