3 APPEALS AT ASSESSMENT HEARING

3 Equalization Appeals Delayed Until November

At an informal session before Judge W. N. Robinson, to investigate the assessment appeal launched by the towns of Burlington, Oakville and Georgetown, it was agreed on Friday of last week to adjourn to sit again November 12.

In his opening remarks to solicitors and other representatives from all municipalities, His Honour explained the three appellants were satisfied to have the appeal heard by the county judge. He added that should one municipality object, the Minister of Municipal Affairs could appoint a board of arbitration to hear the appeal.

Stanley L. Hall, Halton's representative in the Ontario Legislature for the last eight years, was again chosen candidate for the Halton Progressive Conservatives at a convention held in Milton Tuesday evening. George E. Elliott was nominated but withdrew in favor of Mr. Hall.

Nearly 300 delegates and members of the Halton Association jammed the Milton Town Hall giving the candidate a thunderous ovation when he mounted the platform.

Slow Remittance Deferred Grants

Thos. Bradley, attendance officer for the Milton High School submitted his report to the North Halton Board at the meeting in Acton on Monday night. A request for a salary increase was deferred to the next meeting as barely a quorum was at the October meeting to conduct the business.

The Secretary was to write the Public School attendance officers in the district regarding the duplication of work and issuing of permits.

The October accounts amounting to \$11,937.59 were passed for payment.

The Secretary reported that grants had been held up owing to neglect of the Georgetown Municipal Clerk to make the payment due from that town. All the other municipalities had remitted their payment promptly but the neglect of Georgetown had caused a two month's delay.

Jan Mayer, Nassagaweya, was granted permission to attend the Guelph Collegiate and other permits were issued pending investigation by the Secretary.

Permission was given for use of the Milton High School for night classes of the Community Services Branch of the Department of Agriculture.

Principal Robbins extended an invitation for the Board members to attend the Acton High School Commencement next month.

Reference was made in closing to the building program of the three schools. It appeared that four of the municipalities were in agreement to proceed but nothing could develop until after the Georgetown-Esquing settlement of rates had been disposed of before the Municipal Board.

Members in attendance were, Bell, Biehn, Schenck, Pickett, Dills and Buchanan and Chairman Carbert presiding.

Mrs. Ida White, 58, of Milton, was killed instantly Saturday when she walked into the side of a fast-moving CPR passenger train on the fourth line of Trafalgar three miles south of Milton. Provincial Constable Jim Bradley said that the woman had been staying with friends near the crossing.

The regular meeting of the Scotch Block W.I. was held at the home of Mrs. C. Service on Thursday, October 11.

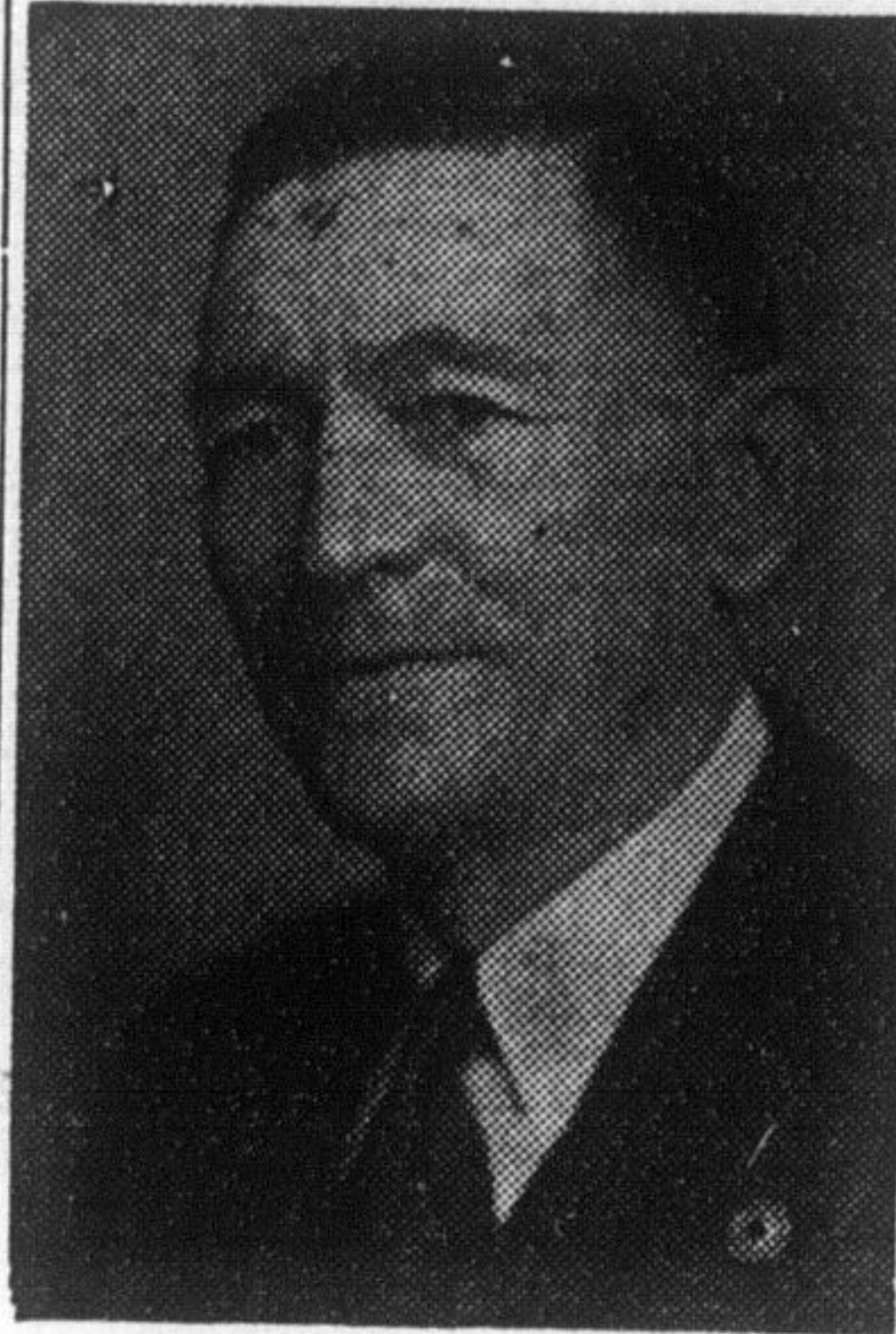
It was decided to donate \$25.00 to the local Children's Aid Society and \$150.00 to the District Institute Fund for the Home for the Aged.

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Pre Wedding Crash Hospitalizes Pair

Two people were injured on the Guelph road two miles north of Campbellville on Friday evening of last week. Roy Bruce, R.R. 1 Mofat and Jean Dennis, R.R. 1 Campbellville are in St. Joseph's Hospital, Hamilton, after their parked car was in collision with a car driven by Donald McIntyre of R.R. 1, Acton.

Roy Bruce suffered a fractured lower jaw, in three places and Jean Dennis multiple lacerations to face, arms and an injured back. The couple were to have been married this Saturday.

Donald McIntyre escaped with a minor cut to the forehead.

The Bruce car was parked on the east side of the road facing south, according to police, and the McIntyre car was travelling north.

Provincial Constable J. Bradley investigated the accident.

County Group Endows Holbrook Pavilion Ward

D. H. Stevens, chairman of the Halton Tuberculosis and Health Association, presented Dr. H. T. Ewart, Medical Superintendent of the Mountain Sanatorium, Hamilton, with a cheque for \$1,000 to endow a ward in the new Holbrook Pavilion in name of the county association at a meeting in Hawthorne Lodge on Monday of this week.

Dr. Ewart pointed out that the pavilion is modernly equipped and will accommodate 64 children with room on the second floor for 42 nurses. It is expected to officially open in November.

The Mountain Sanatorium is the largest institution of its kind in the British Empire, the doctor said, having accommodation for 750 patients. At present there are 14 patients from Halton County hospitalized there.

Various forms of educational programs are carried on by 13 full time teachers and 8 part-time. It is possible to secure your matriculation, university degrees, household economics, sewing, leather work, journalism, salesmanship, business courses or almost anything you might want. Dr. Ewart emphasized.

Dr. Ewart stressed that it would be impossible for the Sanatorium to carry on without the help of voluntary workers and urged the meeting to try to educate the public to this fact.

Dr. W. D. S. Jamieson of the Department of Health, Tuberculosis Division, also attended the meeting and gave details of the mass chest x-ray survey which is to be conducted in Halton County next year. It is planned to have the mobile unit visit both urban and rural areas in the county to give free x-rays. He said the public should be urged to have a yearly chest x-ray.

In spite of the fact there are fewer deaths now from TB, there are just as many active cases found of this infectious disease, as more cases were discovered in 1950 than there were in 1948.

Final plans were made for the Christmas Seal Campaign which opens in November. The funds from this campaign will be used to help defray expenses of the mass survey, for pre-employment x-rays and tuberculin testing of children and to purchase comforts for needy patients from the county. The doctor urged the people of Halton County to contribute to this worthy cause and thus take an active part in the voluntary effort.

FATHER DEAD, SON BADLY BURNED FOLLOWING FARM FIRE ON SUNDAY

John F. Dolby, 77, died of burns and his son Edward is in Milton Private Hospital with fourth degree burns after the wooden building they were living in on the farm of William Johnston, five miles west of here was destroyed by fire Sunday night.

The father and son were living in the one-room building formerly used as a granary which had only one door and was heated by a wood stove between two single beds.

Edward recalls hearing his father adding wood to the stove earlier and when he awoke again he could hardly breathe, because of the smoke in the building. He jumped up, shook his father and thought he answered. He told him to follow him through the window. When he looked back the building was a mass of flames, preventing him from re-entering to aid the older man, Edward said.

The car was parked close to the building and Edward pushed it

down a hill clear of the flames, then he stumbled over to the Johnston farm house. Mr. Johnston called for medical aid and the young man was rushed to Milton Private Hospital for treatment.

"When Edward came to the house and called he was terribly burned all over his body and talking incoherently," Alice Johnston said.

Coroner Dr. C. K. Stevenson attended the scene of the fire.

Edward was hired to work on the farm last spring. Mr. Johnston, farm owner, had two rooms for them but they had planned to move into them but just never got around to it, police report.

Hospital authorities report Edward Dolby, although in critical condition for two days, is progressing satisfactorily.

Funeral services were held for John Dolby from the MacNab and Son Chapel on Tuesday of this week.

No inquest will be held.
