FORD PLANT TO BE SERVICED BY TOWNSHIP WATERMAIN EXTENSION

Water service requirements for the new Ford plant were discussed at some length by members of Trafalgar township council, Trafalgar Public Utilities Commission, Oakville Public Utilities Comm., W. Storrie, the township's consulting engineer and engineering representatives of the Ford Company of Canada, at a special meeting of the township council Monday evening of last week.

It was agreed by the council to proceed, as soon as preliminaries could be arranged, with the construction of an 8-inch water main to connect the plant with the township's main on the eighth line. The length of the main will be approximately 3500 feet.

It will be carried out as a local improvement, with the Ford Company, as the largest taxpayer in the district served, paying the greatest part of the cost. Before construction can be started, a petition bearing signatures of at least three of the five property owners in the district must be in council's hands. Two already have signed.

George Main, Ford representative who discussed the matter with council, pointed out that the firm was most anxious not to cause a water shortage to any residents of the neighborhood.

Hilmer Lofquist, chairman of Oakville Public Utilities Commission, was planning to install high pressure booster pumps at a point east of the 7th line and stated that this would ensure adequate pressure to service the Ford plant in the future.

The possibility was discussed of the township and the Ford company coming to some arrangement by which the township could make use of the intake pipe which the company plans to install in connection with a proposed pumping station on the lake near the foot of the eighth line.

"With the growth of the township we will have to provide our own source of water supply," said Councillor Ernest Pullen. By sharing the company's intake, extra

expense could be avoided, he pointed out.

Reeve Wickson suggested that the council confer with Ford representatives with authority to give a decision on this matter.

D. A. McConachie, township solicitor, declared emphatically that the South-east Trafalgar Ratepayers' Association should be acquainted with the proposal to build the pumping station. The reeve suggested that company representatives attend a meeting of the Association to discuss the company's plans as they were likely to affect the restricted area.

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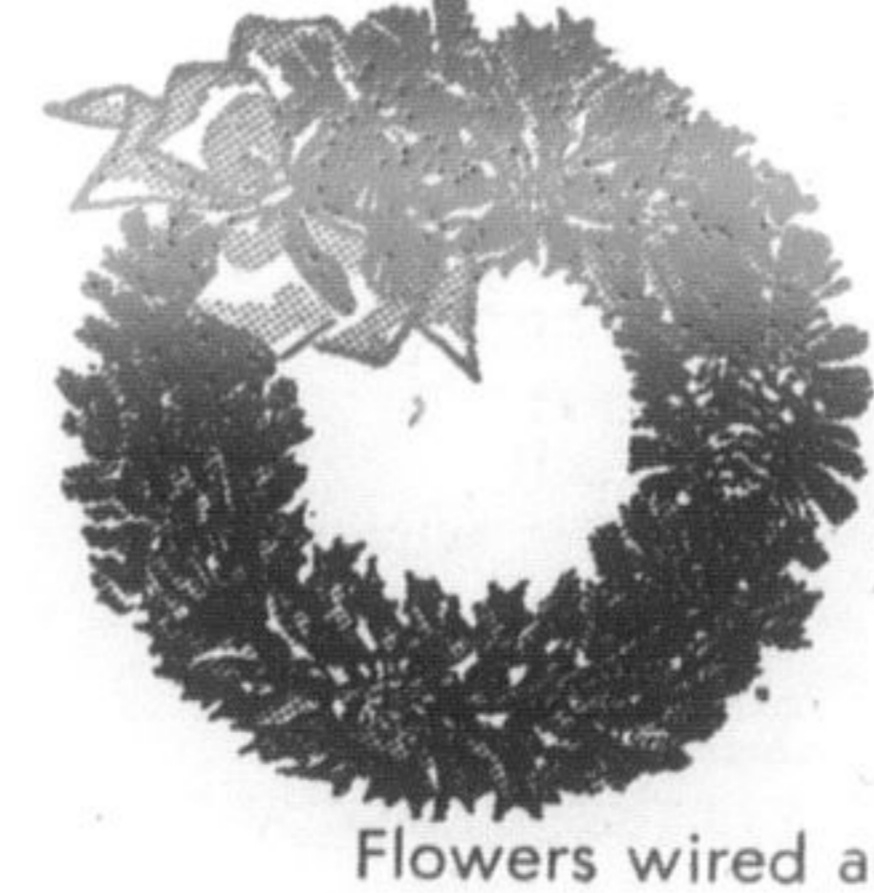
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
