Happy New Year Everyone!
Sparkle, rattle, tinsel and bustle—seals, ribbons, boxes and bundles have ended up with family gatherings and gay greetings. Christmas was all this—but much more, too. Christmas was a time for living memories, and for building pictures that will remain with little tots for the rest of their lives. It isn't just one day—it is usually one month of exciting activity that brings out the stars in children's eyes.

TAKE A TIP

1. To prevent candles from dripping keep them in the refrigerator overnight.
2. Twelve to fourteen pound turkeys require about eight cups soft bread crumbs for stuffing.
3. To make an extra quantity of turkey gravy cook the giblets, neck and heart in 2 quarts of water. Buy an extra half pound of hearts for making a good quality stock.
4. To make a Cranberry relish mix 1 pint cranberries (about 1/2 pound), 1 cup sugar and 1/2 cup water in a saucepan. Stir over moderate heat for 2 or 3 minutes. Bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Cover pan and cook over low heat about 10 minutes. Remove from heat. Let stand covered for 20 minutes then pour into refrigerator dish and chill.
5. To thoroughly mash turnips whip with food mixer. Flavour turnips with a little sugar, milk and a dash of nutmeg.
6. To serve a not-so-sweet sauce for pudding cook a Lemon Sauce: Mix 2 tbsps. flour, 2 tbsps. lemon rind, 1/2 cup sugar with 2 cups warm water. Boil the mixture 5 minutes. Remove from heat and add 4 tbsps. lemon juice and 3 tbsps. butter.
7. To make an inexpensive Sugar-Plum tree: Cut the side of an empty can (such as one that is emptied of corn) into narrow strips vertically from top to bottom. Each strip is twisted a bit, spread out, and the ends are snipped to a point. Finally, cookies are affixed to each end. To prevent breaking the cookies, make holes by spearing them with a metal skewer dipped in hot water.

THE QUESTION BOX

Mrs. K. T. asks: What is the recipe for fruit stuffing?
Answer: Fruit Stuffing for Goose
1/2 cup butter
1 tbsps. minced onion
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup grated carrot
1/4 tsp. ground cloves
1 tsp. paprika
1/2 cup sultana raisins
1/2 cup crushed pineapple
3 cups bread crumbs
Melt butter. Add vegetables and cook until tender. Add spices, fruit and crumbs. Mix well; sprinkle with warm water. Stuff lightly.

Mrs. S. M. asks: How to bake a ham?
Answer: Whenever possible follow the cooking instructions given by the packers. If these are not provided either bake or simmer the ham until almost tender. Within the last 45 minutes remove paper and rind, make a series of shallow cuts across the fat. Spread with a mixture of 1 cup brown sugar mixed with rind and juice of 1 orange. Insert 8 or 10 cloves. Bake uncovered at 325 degrees.

Mrs. E. C. asks: Recipe for spare-ribs for 4 people.
Answer: Sw'et and Sour Spare-ribs
1 1/2 lbs. spare-ribs, back
2 eggs
Flour
Cut spare-ribs into 2 inch size pieces, bone and all. Dip into two beaten eggs and then in flour and saute quickly for about 15 mins. Add sweet and sour sauce; a cooked sugar mixture of 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/2 cup vinegar, 1 cup water, 3/4 c up chili sauce.

Statue of Virgin At Milton Church

In an effort to move people to return to the practice of daily prayer in their homes, three Priests are carrying Pilgrim Statues of the Mother of Christ into cities and towns all over the world. One of these Statues was brought to Milton last Saturday night by Father Patrick Moore, S.F.M., and was enshrined in Holy Rosary Church until Sunday afternoon.

On October 13th, 1917, during the first Great War, some 70,000 people converged on the little town of Fatima, in Portugal, when the Blessed Virgin appeared to three small children—Jacinta 7, Francis 9, and Lucy 10—and told them that if people ever wanted to know the meaning of peace, they would have to go to their knees in prayers in their homes.

Since then, Jacinta and Francis have died, Lucy is spending the rest of her days in prayer in a Carmelite Convent, and the message given to them at Fatima has been carried to millions of people all over the world.

The three Statues that are being used to bring home the idea to the people were carved at Fatima to portray the Blessed Virgin as she was seen by the three children. One is now on its journey through the countries of Europe. The second is being taken through the United States. The third, which came through Milton on Saturday night, has been in South America, some Islands in the Pacific, Central America and Alaska. To date it has covered over 40,000 miles by air, by dog sled, by beasts of burden, and by truck.

It is expected that within the next ten years the three Statues of the Pilgrim Virgin with their message of the Rosary will have been carried through every country in the world—except Russia.
