Although only a resident of the area a few years, Mrs. Mack has become very interested in all things historical around here. She and her husband live in a cosy home surrounded by acres of trees on the Eramosa river near the village of Eden Mills.

And they have ordinary Canadian winter birds eating from a wild-bird feeding station in front of their living room window. They have beautiful peacocks including white ones, and a tame pheasant.
