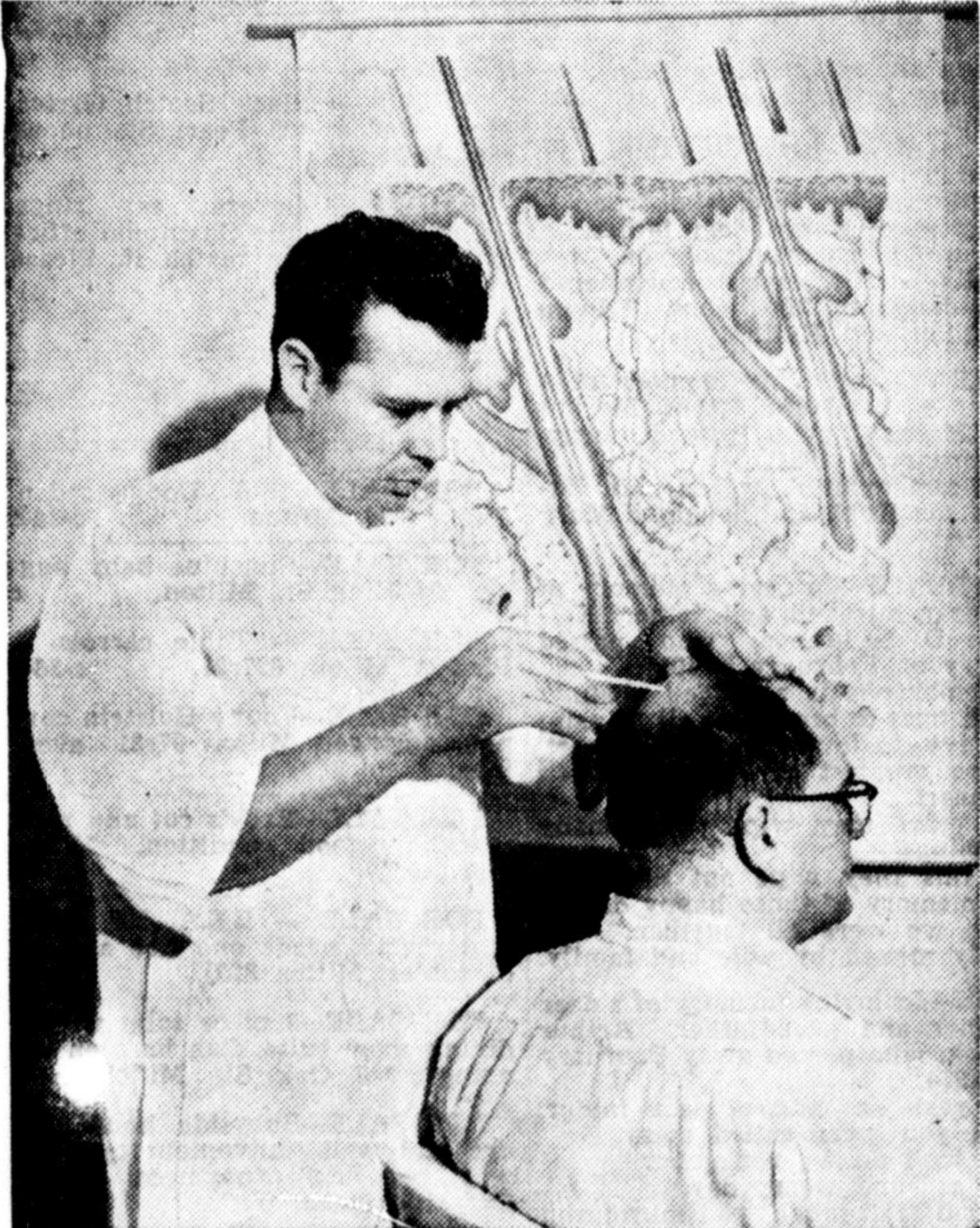
A LITTLE NONSENSE

Old Timer at Hotel Notes Big Changes

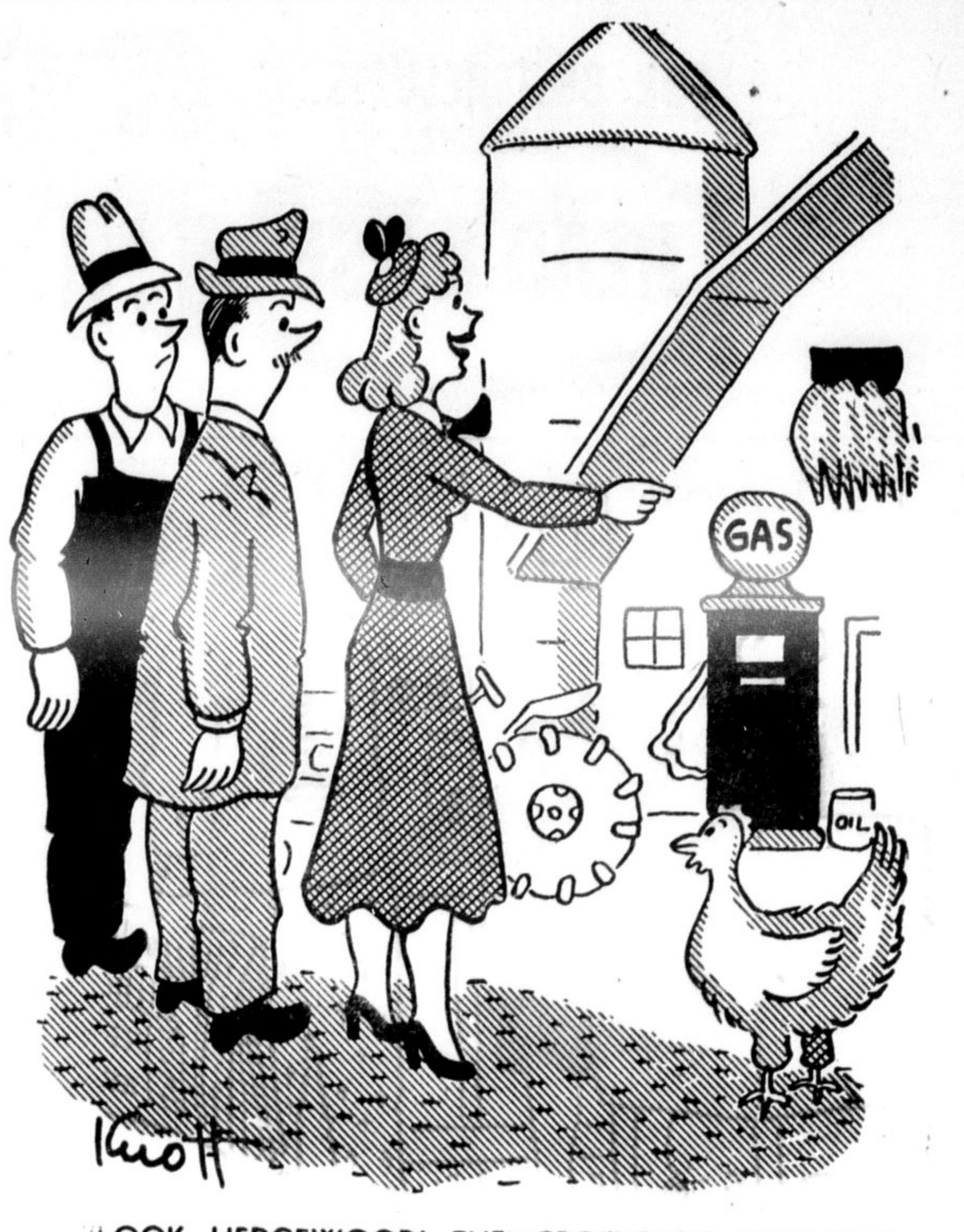
Toronto (CP)—An 80-year-old cashier at a Toronto hotel has memories of choice historical tidbits.
Thomas Randall, after 49 years' service, is still at his desk in the King Edward Hotel. He came to the hotel when it opened in 1903. He figures on completing 50 years' service before retiring.
A half-century ago, he says, "there was a separate entrance and elevator for women." The weaker sex had to be spared the embarrassment of being stared at by strangers.
The hotel's most colorful era was the period 1907-11 when the newly-discovered mines at Cobalt brought the average daily registration to 600.
Colorful personalities like Harry Oakes, Noah Timmins, Joseph Seagram and Simon Dymant came and went as the hotel's special guests. Mr. Randall remembers the special bath tub the hotel had built for one guest with a 300 pound frame.
Old-Time Feasts
Menus were elaborate. Anchovy on toast, Montreal melon, planked whitefish, Parisienne potatoes, French peas and Turkish coffee were popular.
In 1910 the tea dance came into vogue and Mr. Randall recalls the First World War when gay young officers and their girls flirted madly on nothing stronger than tea. Night clubs were unknown in that era.
Mr. Randall says he never owned a car and until he took up gardening, walked six miles a day for his health.
For the fact that he's cashed only one bad cheque in 49 years he thanks experience, not instinct.

Minister Stresses Health Unit Value

Commenting on the value of the 27 Ontario Health Units of which the Halton County Health Unit was one of the first, Health Minister Phillips said the operation of Health Units is the most economical way of providing preventive medical care to rural areas and widely scattered towns and cities which do not have municipal health departments. The comment was contained in a National Health Week statement.
"The work of Health Units and such observances as National Health Week have everything in common—the prevention of disease by all possible means," Dr. Phillips' statement said. "Good luck to both."
"We know that people are becoming increasingly health conscious, and that Governments are no exceptions," Dr. Phillips' statement said. "In Ontario, the Provincial Government is aware of the many problems still confronting public health workers, and is doing its best to help meet all situations. However, we do believe that much depends on the people themselves and that their best guidance comes from the local level—municipal departments of health and health units, all of which we are glad to support fully. We are firm believers in the value of Health Units."
"However, there is nothing compulsory about the formation of such units—it is the desire of the people themselves which provides the final decision."
Dr. Phillips' statement went on to explain how Health Units are operated. They were unions of rural and urban municipalities for the purpose of providing more efficient community health programs on the preventive side. Their free services involved communicable disease control; maternal, infant and child hygiene; environmental sanitation, and public health education.
Back of the individual Units was the Ontario Department of Health which, besides lending substantial financial support, provided consultative services in the various fields involved.
