Farm Population Just 15 Per Cent.

The Limestone farm forum met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Coulson on Monday evening with Mrs. W. Carter and Mrs. V. Norris acting as joint hostesses. After a discussion period on Education for Farming, J. E. Whitelock was introduced and gave one of his usual informative and interesting talks.

He stated that due to increased industrialization in the county and elsewhere, farming population had decreased to the point where today 15 per cent. of the people of Canada were providing agricultural products for the other 85 per cent. Thus, education was needed to provide efficient methods of farm management, soil conservation, etc., pointing out that the 4-H work for young people was an invaluable way of obtaining pertinent information and also contributed to the social side of rural life.

H. A. Speers moved the vote of thanks to the speaker and hosts. Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Dolbel invited the group to their home for the meeting next week.

RATEPAYERS, NELSON COUNCIL PACK ROOM FOR BUSY MEETING MONDAY

Faced with a heavy agenda Monday night, Nelson township council extended its meeting time until 11:30 in order to deal hurriedly with by-laws and motions after hearing deputations.

"We will have to meet at 7 p.m. in order to finish by 1 a.m. next time," reeve Harold Adkins remarked after he and members of council patiently listened to many problems of ratepayers without being able to offer any definite solution to any of them.

John Mills of Mills, Spence and Company, addressed council concerning a bid for the township's forthcoming debenture issues of \$200,000 and \$140,000. A competitor also spoke briefly on the subject.

"It is general knowledge that the bond market is strong and likely to be stronger; we are not yet in a position to offer debentures for sale except under provision of sale," Reeve Adkins said. There was a possibility of \$220,000 more in addition to the \$340,000, which would make a better and more substantial amount to put on the market.

Halton TB Sales Up 15 Per Cent. in '54

Sale of TB Seals at Christmas-time, 1954, was reported to be a 15 per cent. increase over the previous year when members of the executive of the Halton County Tuberculosis Association met in Milton Monday evening.

At the same meeting the officers of the Association planned the annual meeting to be held in Trafalgar hall in April.

Plans were considered to investigate possibility of a mobile chest X-ray clinic to service the northern part of Halton county. Such a clinic would extend chest X-ray facilities and allow district medical practitioners a more convenient means to have patients X-rayed, it was pointed out.

Dr. A. Bull, Halton Medical Officer of Health, reported that over one-half the school children in the county have had TB tests this winter. The "patch tests" are made to determine, more directly, if a child has ever been in contact with TB. It was noted that only about two per cent. of the tests reacted positively and that no active cases have been discovered so far.

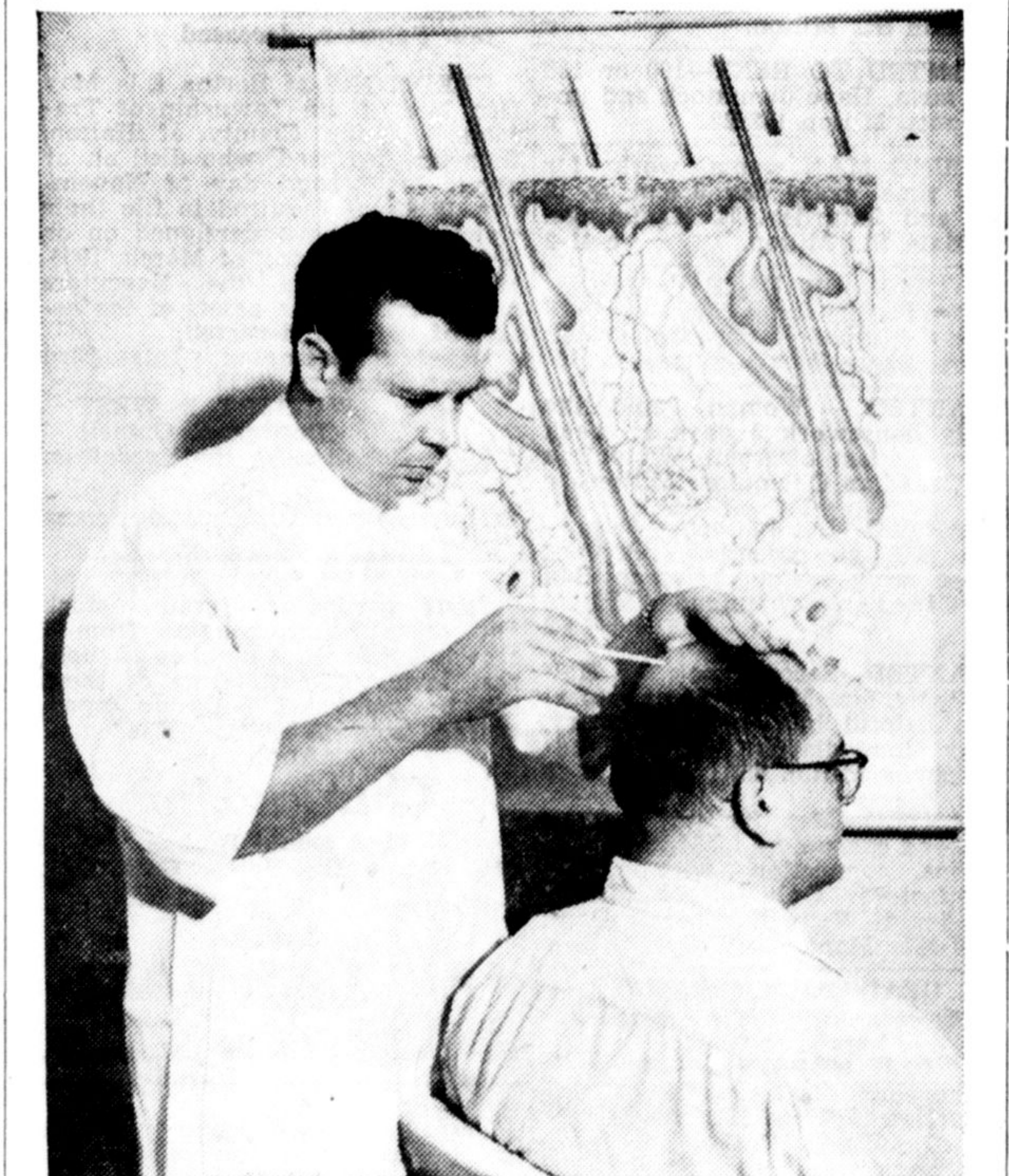

F. Gallagher is to be notified that the council will endeavor to correct the drainage problem on the Robert Lyan farm.
