Stress Need for Young People At Annual Halton W.M.S. Meet

Installation of new officers, annual reports and guest speakers highlighted the 26th annual meeting of the Halton Presbyterial of the Women's Missionary Society of the United Church of Canada in First United Church, Port Credit, Tuesday, April 19. Mrs. W. N. Brownridge, president, opened the meeting with a welcome to delegates, members and friends.

Installation of new officers, annual reports and guest speakers highlighted the 26th annual meeting. The worship service, based on the theme "The Christian Hope" was conducted by Miss Margaret A. Scrimgeour, B.A., Missionary on furlough from Trinidad. The speaker said that sometimes a challenge to the belief in the Resurrection is voiced but that this belief matters greatly. To live a "good life" is not enough. There must be that "extra", the faith, the hope which the Christian has and others have not. Thus out of the Resurrection is the greatest essential, the Christian Hope, she said.

Minutes of the previous annual meeting were read by Mrs. Faux Ball and Mrs. E. M. Readhead, corresponding secretary, brought greetings from five Presbyterials: Hamilton, Niagara Falls, Brantford, Haldimand-Norfolk and Bruce.

Mrs. G. DeCoursey described many books and pamphlets, which she felt would make interesting reading, as well as assist the members in their missionary efforts. Her attractive book display was later visited by many of those present. The Acton Auxiliary received the award of a gift book, for having read the greatest number of books, per member, of a missionary character, during the year.

A solo, sung by Mrs. K. G. Partridge was greatly enjoyed.

Conducts Workshop
Mrs. A. W. Collard, Christian stewardship secretary of the Hamilton Conference Branch, conducted a Christian Stewardship Workshop. The duties of a Christian Stewardship Secretary were read by Miss A. Blanchard and each phase of this important work was discussed.

Mrs. A. R. Stacey, welcomed the guests and a most enjoyable luncheon was served by the Evening Branch of the Women's Missionary Society of First Church. Greetings were brought to the meeting from the Halton Presbyterial W.A. by Mrs. Velma Norris and from the Conference Branch by Mrs. A. W. Collard.

In the afternoon, Mission Band Awards were presented to many auxiliaries by Mrs. N. McDonald, who spoke of the need for leaders and Mrs. McDonald who hoped that there would be an advantage in the Mission Band work this year.

The Worship Service was conducted by the Milton Afternoon Auxiliary. The theme was "My Responsibility." Mrs. R. B. Galbraith read several verses of injunctions from the Bible, to illustrate a Christian's responsibility to God, his fellowmen and to himself. This was followed with prayer by Mrs. King.

Exceeded Allocation
Miss A. Blanchard reported for Christian Stewardship. Last year the allocation for the Halton Presbyterial was \$11,235. This was met and exceeded by \$1,438, which was given for building advance, to go to a broadcasting station in Japan.

Mrs. Ross Segsworth presented the treasurer's report and requested that all auxiliaries send in their reports to her on time.

The roll call was taken by Mrs. E. M. Readhead, following which the offering was received and dedicated by the Melville Auxiliary.

Mrs. H. W. Vrooman, Candidate Advisor, Hamilton Conference Branch, with the assistance of Mrs. G. J. Patterson, past president of the Hamilton Conference Branch and Mrs. Ross Patterson, first vice-president of the Hamilton Conference Branch, conducted a panel discussion. Conversation and questions elicited many ways and means that had been tried and recommended for interesting young people in full-time church work. At the present time 50 women workers are needed in Canada. The panel closed with the Scriptural appeal

"Pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth labourers."

An impressive memorial service was conducted by the Burlington Auxiliary, at the conclusion of which Mrs. Gordon Kidney of Georgetown sang "How Beautiful Upon the Mountains."

Mrs. E. Woods introduced the guest speaker, Miss Ruth Tillman, a missionary on furlough from Bonavista Presbytery, Newfoundland. Miss Tillman's pleasing personality and the interesting story of her work and experience in Newfoundland charmed her audience.

The people of Newfoundland are most appreciative and responsive when trained workers of the Church go into their communities. The hardship of the ministration lies in the fact that there is 6,000 miles of coastline, along which many people are scattered.

Young People Needed
Miss Tillman told of the organization of camps and the efforts of the students, who had much goodwill but who had little training to promote the work of the church. She stressed the great need for young people in church work—such as caravanning work in the summer, visiting, helping in Sunday School work, C.G.I.T. work, etc.

Big Georgetown Construction Job

Tenders are out for one of Georgetown's largest construction jobs in several years.

The town is asking for price quotations on a storage reservoir and pump house for the new water supply system, as well as tenders for new mains to be constructed as part of the system.

Phillips and Roberts, Brantford, are consulting engineers on the project, which entails a new source of supply in the lower Main street area to supplement the present system where water is pumped directly from a deep well into the mains.

No Definite Plans For Hospital Drive

Still investigating the possibility of a hospital in Georgetown, the Chamber of Commerce there invited two men instrumental in conducting a hospital campaign in Dunnville in 1951 to a meeting.

Hon. James Allan, Ontario minister of highways, M. K. Humpage and Mr. Root were the visitors who met with representatives of several local organizations.

They described in some detail the groundwork which was done before the Dunnville hospital came into being and the way a fund campaign was conducted successfully in that town.

"Mr. Allan's visit has revised some of our thinking and has given us valuable information for reference if and when Georgetown embarks on a hospital venture," said John Gunn, Chamber of Commerce president, commenting after the meeting.

The Chamber will continue to investigate hospital possibilities, but as yet has made no definite plans to promote a campaign.
