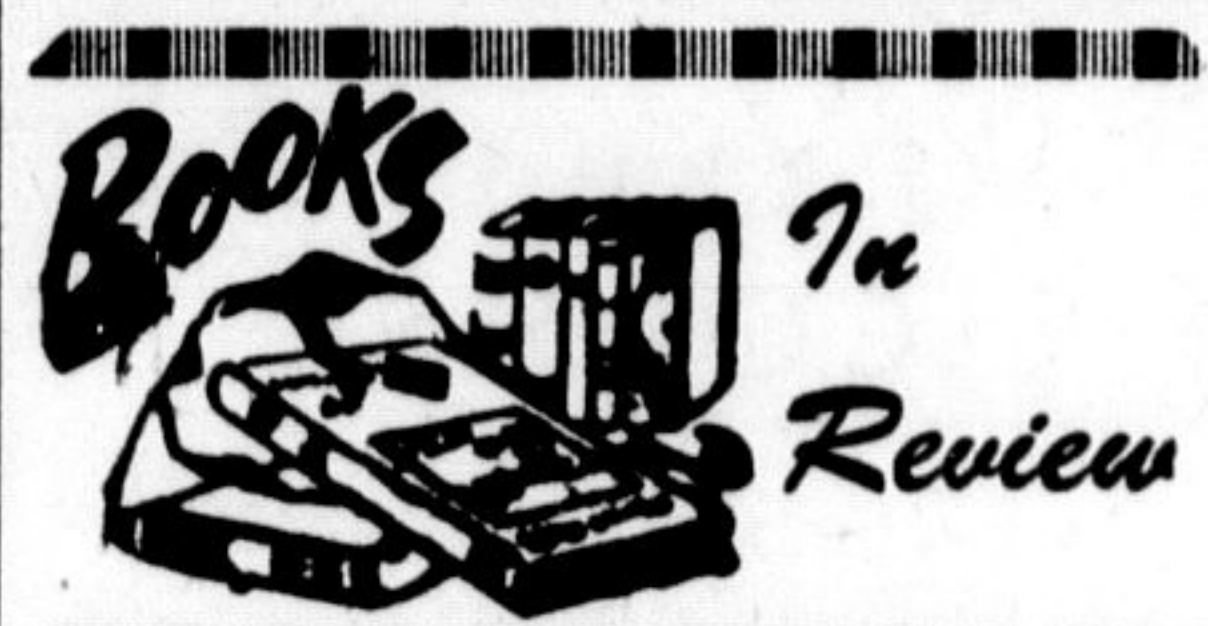

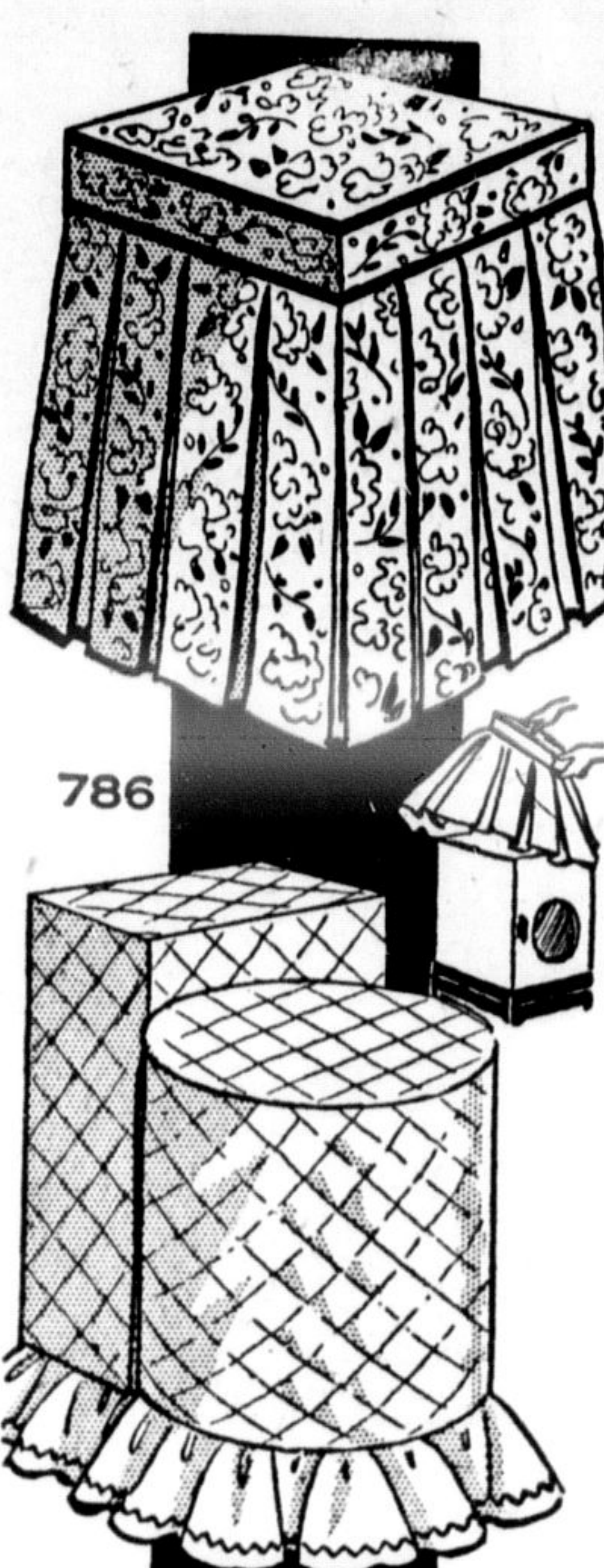

The Week at Otrawa

OTTAWA (CP) — The Commons budget debate brought opposition leader Drew to his feet for one of his most forceful speeches since his recent recovery from meningitis.

He termed "reckless and irresponsible" the current federal offer to share unemployment relief costs with the provinces and municipalities. In a strong tone that reached every corner of the chamber, he said the federal offer was sprung at the federal-provincial conference merely to catch the public's eye and that the government admittedly had no facts on which to base its proposal.

"They did not have anything to put before that conference . . .," he said, "not a thing."

Echoes of 1945

Mr. Drew, who returned to the Commons in February after his illness, tangled with two cabinet ministers on older political grounds—the 1945-46 federal - provincial conference. He accused the government of having "scuttled" that conference nearly a decade ago.

Health Minister Martin countered with the claim that Mr. Drew—then Ontario premier—was "one of the main factors why that conference did not succeed."

And Justice Minister Garson, who attended the conference as Manitoba's premier, said negotiations foundered because Quebec refused to enter a tax rental agreement and because Ontario demanded too much money for an agreement.

Mr. Drew said the facts on which to base discussions were lacking in the new federal offer of unemployment relief aid and were also lacking in the government's historic "green book" proposals in 1945.

That conference failed to reach agreement, he said, because it was adjourned indefinitely and the federal government refused to meet the provinces again. As premier of Ontario he had sought to get agreement, had sat through to the end of the conference and "urged acceptance of the proposals when the facts were obtained."

His reference to the new federal proposal was made only in passing. Debate ranged mostly around the 1945-46 federal offers — including health and social service measures, public works planning and employment measures, in return for tax-rental agreements.

Nine provinces—all except Quebec—now have tax agreements with the central government, giving it exclusive rights in certain direct tax fields in return for annual grants. Mr. Martin said most of the 1945 offers, though put forward as an integrated plan dependent on fiscal agreement, had been implemented "to a degree much in excess of the levels proposed in 1945."

More than two-thirds of the proposals of health and welfare had since been implemented despite the lack of agreement in 1945-46. Detailing some of the developments since then, he said tax rental payments to provinces this year total \$220,350,000 against \$206,800,000 offered in 1945.

Help for hospital construction, offered in 1945 on the basis of low interest loans, was being given in outright grants that had helped provide 68,000 hospital beds since the federal health plan began in 1948.

The government also had gone ahead with universal old age pensions at 70. The 1945 offers of old age assistance to those 65-69, blindness and disability pension had been achieved jointly with the provinces on better terms. Mr. Martin agreed that the offer on health insurance has not been implemented.

Immigration Minister Pickersgill told the Commons that maintenance of a racial balance in Canada plays no part in government immigration policy. He was replying to the concern expressed by Gordon Churchill (PC-Winnipeg South Centre) over the declining share of Britons in the inflow of immigrants. Mr. Churchill said there had been an apparent change in immigration policy since 1949.

"To the best of my knowledge," said Mr. Pickersgill, "this department does not now and never has paid any attention to keeping a racial balance. And I hope it never will."

He said the department would like to see more immigrants coming from the British Isles and is concerned about their falling numbers. It gave preference to them because they fit quickly and more easily into Canadian life.

But the policy of preference and selection is not based on race or creed, he said. "It is based upon a conception of adaptability to the kind of society we have tried to build in this country in the last 300 years."

Politics on TV

Ontario voters likely will be the first Canadians in history to get their political campaigning over television. A CBC spokesman says the publicly-owned corporation is prepared to permit its own stations and those privately owned to be used for political purposes in the campaign for the June 9 Ontario election.

"The various political parties participating in the Ontario election will be given free time on the Ontario television network for political speeches if they want it," the spokesman said.

He disclosed that CBC officials, including chairman A. D. Dunton, plan a Toronto meeting with officials of the Ontario Progressive Conservative, Liberal and CCF parties to discuss TV use in the campaign.

Federal political parties decided not to use television during the 1953 general election campaign. The Liberal, Progressive Conservative, CCF and Social Credit parties felt at that time the medium was too new and that such use of it requires further study.

Australia Favors IWA

Australia has joined Canada in favoring renewal of the three-year international wheat agreement which expires in July, 1956. Trade Minister Howe said on return from a three week tour of Australia and New Zealand. Another major exporter under the 47-country agreement is the United States, which has not yet given firm indication whether it wants the agreement continued.

Told of severe Prairie storms, Mr. Howe said: "I never heard of a crop being killed in May. The grounds dry up just as fast as it gets wet."

With continued use, the bright colors of your carpet become dulled even with daily care.

First—cleaning with a dry cleaning fluid or one of the synthetic types diluted with water. If care is taken in sponging the surface, no rings will mar its beauty. This method is not recommended for use over a long period of time, as it leaves a residue in the carpeting, which in turn tends to soil easily.

The second method of cleaning is with an absorbent powder cleaner. Simply sprinkle over the rug, sweep up with the vacuum and you will find your rug much brighter.

Be sure your rugs are an unpopular hiding place for moths and carpet beetles—they breed in dark spots, so see that your rooms have plenty of air and sunshine. Good moth repellents are easy to use and may be sprayed on with the help of your vacuum.
