More Expansion For Ford Plant

Ford Motor Co. of Canada is considering another round of expansion to keep up with growing demand. Rhys M. Sale, president, told the annual meeting in Windsor.

Further major projects being considered would be in addition to \$87 million spent on new facilities and expansion completed since 1950.

The company has under "active consideration" an increase in the capacity of the plant in Trafalgar township to assemble passenger cars. This would probably entail construction of a new plant for the production of trucks, he said.

Study is also being given to a possible large-scale rearrangement of the layout of the machine shop at Windsor, which covers 18 acres.

The Week at Ottawa

OTTAWA (CP) — A story that started quietly enough a few weeks back blossomed last week into headlines involving three parties, two federal cabinet ministers, a premier and the prime minister.

James Dempsey, 68 year old Ottawa Valley lumberman who had represented Renfrew South in the Ontario legislature for 10 years, first announced he was withdrawing from the June 9 Ontario election for health reasons. Later he admitted he had been asked to bow out by officials of the Progressive Conservative party he has served and by Premier Frost.

The reason, it developed, was that he had not reported a \$6,800 contribution for his 1951 election campaign from a constituent, John Drohan.

It further became apparent that the information from which Premier Frost made his decision to withdraw his support of Mr. Dempsey had come from Revenue Minister McCann, Liberal member of the Commons for Renfrew South.

The question of Dr. McCann's propriety in giving the information to Premier Frost was raised from several corners.

Supports McCann

At week's end Prime Minister St. Laurent, in reply to opposition suggestions, had told the Commons he won't act against Dr. McCann on the claims that the cabinet member misused information to hit at a political antagonist.

Mr. St. Laurent said he is satisfied the 68 year old doctor didn't violate accepted practice in his involvement in the politically - hot Dempsey case.

The prime minister turned down a CCF proposal that he make a personal investigation into Dr. McCann's part in the issue. He also rejected a suggestion that the minister is wrong in holding a directorship in a trust company that has dealings with the revenue department.

A further suggestion for a Commons committee investigation of the minister's role in the funds case was made by E. G. McCullough (CCF-Moose Mountain), who said Dr. McCann should resign or be eased out of the cabinet if found to have committed an "indiscretion."

Mr. St. Laurent, who gave up a half dozen company directorships when he joined the cabinet in 1941, was not in the House to hear the McCullough proposal.

Mr. Dempsey says he made a mistake in not conforming to provincial law to make public some \$5,000—the amount is vague—in contributions from Mr. Drohan.

Mr. Drohan died in 1952 and his estate is being wound up by the Guaranty Trust Co., of which the revenue minister is a director. Mr. Frost is said to have seen photostatic copies of receipts given by Mr. Dempsey to Mr. Drohan. There has been no denial of published

Northern Minerals

An outline of plans for developing a vast new mineral deposit in the far north was given to the Commons by Northern Affairs Minister Lesage, who said a rail line is planned to tap one of the world's largest lead-zinc ore deposits at Pine Point on the south shore of Great Slave lake.

The Northwest Territories' ore lode is 300 to 400 miles north of the end of steel at Grimshaw in Alberta's Peace River district and Mr. Lesage said he hopes the government and Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. can make arrangements to develop it.

Plans were to build the railway "in days not too far off" to get the ore out. "We have been discussing and still are discussing the economic implications of such a project," he said.

During discussion preceding approval of the estimates of Mr. Lesage's department, Opposition Leader Drew urged a campaign to increase northern population as a defence measure with new communities spotted across the area and airports built south of radar bases to handle any paratroop invasion.

The Progressive Conservative leader said he was amazed at Mr. Lesage's statement that there must be jobs in the north before settlers will move in. That was not the way the prairies were opened up, Mr. Drew said. The north's fantastic mineral deposits were "simply staggering." They called for unlimited optimism.

Hanging Substitute

A high informant has told the Commons committee an capital and corporal punishment this session will urge the government to retain capital punishment in Canada but substitute either electrocution or the gas chamber for hanging in executions or condemned persons.

The committee is expected to recommend abolition of hanging on grounds that it belongs to the Middle Ages.

Budget Approved

The Commons has given its assent to Finance Minister Harris' April 5 budget in a vote defeating a Progressive Conservative non-confidence motion 11 to 66. The vote ended the budget debate in its 13th day.

The Liberal majority was supported by four independent members, including former CCF member Ross Thatcher, Moose Jaw-Lake Centre, in opposing the four-point motion proposed April 19 by the Progressive Conservative financial critic, J. M. Macdonnell.

CCF and Social Credit members backed the official opposition's motion. It charged that the budget "failed" to give effective stimulus to enterprise for creation of job and opportunity; to reduce taxation of those with low incomes; to curb government waste and to recognize the serious position of producers.

The vote, together with approval of a routine motion to send tax-change proposals to committee for study, amounted to approval in principle of the budget.

The Conservative motion met the same fate as a CCF motion of non-confidence, defeated 131 to 65 on May 3. That one said the budget "failed" to help provincial governments so they could plan their financing to help ease the burden of heavy municipal taxation.
