

Ask Speed-Up of Overall Zoning In Lower Portion of Nelson Twp.

Nelson Planning Board was requested to speed up its plans for an overall zoning of the lower portion of the township last week when Nelson council delayed passage of a by-law to extend restrictions along the Lakeshore highway. The restricted by-law, given an extension six months ago, expires June 30.

Two other by-laws received their third readings. The first was for issuing of debentures for \$170,000 for the Mountside Drive school in Clarksdale, and the second for a by-law to prohibit obstruction of drains and natural watercourses and for regulating construction of culverts and bridges.

Queensway Drive was officially taken over as a highway by the township on a by-law "to assume lands for highway purposes", which got three readings. Clerk W. K. Sims explained that a Hamilton lawyer had brought up the fact it wasn't legally a street and that a by-law was necessary to have it registered as such.

Among accounts given approval was a finance committee item to refund \$6,000 to E. D. Hickey, Hamilton solicitor, who had acted for F. W. Fearman and Co. Ltd., in the original purchase of 22 acres on Mountside Drive for a meat-packing plant. The money was a deposit in connection with the sale last November.

Mr. Hickey and the township were involved in a legal action after last year's council refused to go on with the deal. The firm since has located on Walker's Line and the action discontinued. However, the township the previous week ordered its solicitor to begin action to recover money paid to William J. Stoneham, Hamilton realtor, in connection with the first sale.

John Stephens, acting for Gordon Cherry, presented a petition signed by 18 out of 19 residents in connection with a proposed house on a divided lot that was under the minimum lot size. He was informed it would be necessary to deposit a cheque for \$75 for a hearing by the Ontario Municipal Board in connection with the application.

Face Court Charges
Despite a May 14 deadline, 118 trailers remained in two Lakeshore trailer camps last week-end and the camp owners, as a result, are facing new charges of contempt of court. This was revealed at council meeting although there was no indication any of the trailers would be moved out in the near future.
