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### Backward Children

NEWCASTLE, N.B. (CP)—S. B. Gavel of Moncton, president of the New Brunswick Association of Children's Aid societies told an Aid group here that institutional care is urgently needed for 300 backward children.

He said there were 7,500 mentally retarded people in New Brunswick, 3,500 of them children. Eight per cent of the children were destitute and without training.
