Red Sox Defeat Acton 11-3, Take Series

Milton Red Sox last night downed a submissive Acton club 11-3 right on the Acton ballfield to wrap up their best-in-five series in four games and reserve the right to advance in the O.B.A. Intermediate B play-downs.

The Red Sox never really had any trouble in the series outside of the first game. When they were slow in producing runs the Acton club obligingly came through with errors to aid them.

Manager Lenny Naylor picked Doug Vaughan to hurl for the locals in what started out to be a repeat of Monday night's fast game but an erratic Acton club was soon booting the ball all over the field. Vaughan went the distance for Milton, allowing only three hits, walking two and whiffing eight.

His opposite, on the hill for Acton, southpaw Harry Lawson, was the victim of 10 hits before he was replaced by Spike Scott in the seventh. Scott was nicked for four additional bingles to give Milton 14 hits and 11 runs.

Milton took the initiative in the top half of the second by scoring

two runs. South got on first through a misplay at first and Doucette rammed a drive to centre that netted him two bags. Leaver's fly into deep right was caught but South scored the first one. Then Bill Vaughan's grounder to first was muffed and Doucette came in with number two.

Acton scored again in the bottom half of the fourth when Skilling walked, stole second and in the confusion when he was trapped between second and third took advantage of Rusk's overthrow to come home.

From that juncture the game was never even close. Milton went on to score six runs off five hits in the fifth and never looked back. They added two more in the seventh off four hits to give them 11 runs.

Acton, meanwhile, could do little with the offerings of Vaughan until the last of the ninth when Skilling, their best man singled, stole second, advanced to third on McCristall's ground-out, scoring as Townsley singled to centre.

Top man on the Milton totem was Shep Doucette who came through with four hits in five trips and Bill Vaughan with three hits in five appearances at the plate. Johnny Heipel, Fred Leaver and Don Mills each came through with two hits in five trips to the plate.

The fielding gem of the game was Sham Rusk's spearing of Lawson's shoe-lace drive in the third frame.
