

President of Halton District W.I. Mrs. M. Featherstone Dies Sunday

The president of Halton County District Women's Institute, Mrs. Max Featherstone, died at her Burlington home Sunday. She was 50 years old. Mrs. Featherstone, active for several years in local and county organizations, was especially prominent in W. I. activities. She was widely known in both the north and south ends of the county. The former Florence Gowdy Huffman, she was born at Napanee, a daughter of the late Thomas and Emmalie Huffman, but had lived the majority of her life in Nelson township. She was a member of the Can-

ada Street Gospel Hall in Hamilton and taught Sunday School at St. Paul's Presbyterian church. A former teacher, she had taught public school in Tuck's School on No. 5 Highway, for about 10 years. The deceased is survived by her husband, two daughters, Ruth and Audrey, and two sons, Craig and Frederick, all at home. One sister, Mrs. Eric Marshall (Annette) lives in Burlington and a brother, Seth Huffman, also lives in that community. Funeral service was held from the family residence Wednesday and burial was in St. Paul's cemetery, Nelson.

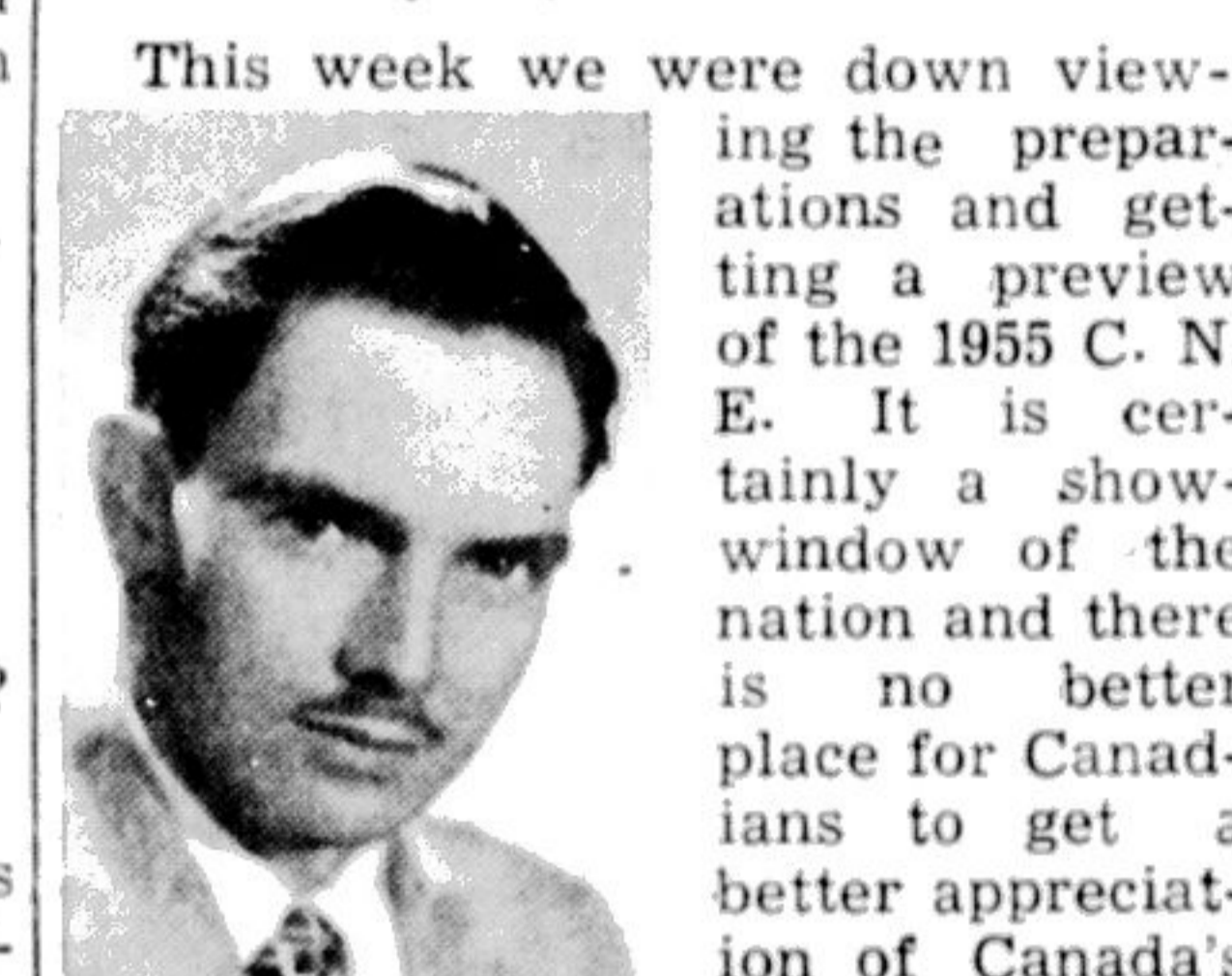

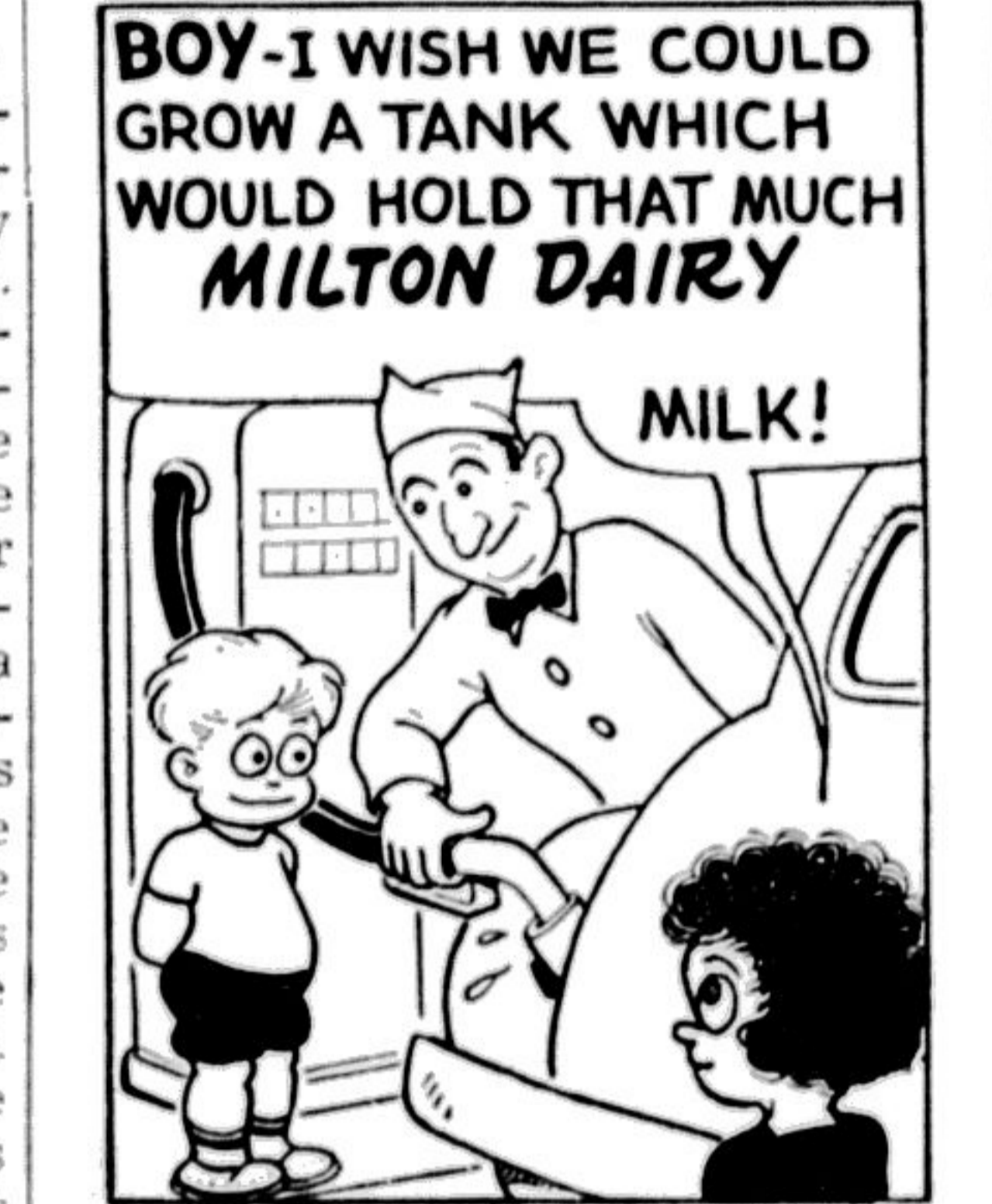
Residents Visit with Friends in Summer
