Tablet Honors Ontario Artist

A tablet honoring the memory of Homer Watson, the great Ontario landscape painter, was unveiled at the former Watson home at Doon, seven miles south-east Kitchener on Saturday, September 10. This tablet was erected by the Historic Sites Division of the Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources on the recommendation of the Historic Sites and Monuments Boards.

Mr. Watson, who spent most of his life at Doon until his death in 1936, gained international recognition for his paintings of Ontario rural and pioneer life. He was the Canadian Art Club's first president and was a fellow and for four years the president of the Royal Canadian Academy of Art. His home is now the Doon School of Fine Arts.

The unveiling of the tablet coincided with the opening of an exhibition of paintings by students from the Doon School of Fine Arts. R. M. Myers, M.P. for Waterloo South, unveiled the tablet, and Clare Bice, curator of the London, Ontario Art Gallery, spoke. Chairman of the program was F.
