NEWS SPOTLIGHT

Ousted from power after 10 years of dictatorship in Argentina, 59-year-old Juan Peron last week entered the car of the Paraguayan ambassador at Buenos Aires and drove to the docks. Under diplomatic protection, he boarded a tiny Paraguayan warship preparatory to exile.

A revolt led by generals and admirals had knocked him from power. In his 10 years of rule, Peron had suppressed civil liberties, persecuted religion, wiped out the free press and got the country into economic difficulties.

Succeeding the dictator as provisional president was Maj.-Gen. Eduardo Lonardi, rebel leader in Cordoba and long time enemy of Peron. Lonardi had also been a critic of the "petticoat rule" of the late Evita Peron, the dictator's wife.

Relaxed Atmosphere The 10th United Nations general assembly wound up its first week of policy debate at New York in a relaxed atmosphere reflecting the Geneva summit conference, but with no noticeable shift in the East-West positions.

U.S. state secretary Dulles and Soviet foreign minister Molotov both spoke in the moderate vein that has characterized east-west relations since the Geneva talks. But both stood fast by the positions of their governments on such key questions as German unifications, disarmament and the atomic issue.

The Geneva spirit was reflected somewhat in the temperate resolution Molotov introduced at the close of his speech. Omitting the usual Soviet invective against the west, it merely proposed that the assembly consider all plans for disarmament and other proposals designed to ease international tensions.

No Treasure The Duke of Argyll, who has spent a fortune trying to raise a 400-year-old Spanish treasure ship from its ocean bed in the bay of Tobermory, Scotland, has given up the battle.

The 52-year-old duke, wealthy head of the Campbell clan, for years has been searching for the Duke de Florencia, the pay ship of the Spanish armada. Under a charter signed by King Charles I, the duke has rightful claim to anything salvaged from the galleon. Using modern salvage equipment

and frogmen divers this summer, he at last pin-pointed the galleon's burial ground.

Thousands of tourists all summer flocked to the port on the little Island of Mull and watched a giant dredge bring up planks of rotting African oak—ship's timbers—and fragments of ancient earthenware. As the weeks went by, divers found rusting sword scabbards and more earthenware—but no gold.

Finally the duke set a deadline. He gave his frogmen divers until September 23 to strike gold. They didn't and he paid them off.

Big Newcomer Ambika, a young elephant from India, settled down in her new home at the Granby, Que. zoo after receiving an enthusiastic welcome. The three-year-old elephant, named after a city in India, was officially turned over to Granby on behalf of Prime Minister Nehru by Dr. S. Gupta, First Secretary of the Indian high commissioner's office at Ottawa.

Thousands of children lined the parade route as a procession of police, guests and dignitaries strolled to the zoological gardens with the half-ton Ambika standing proudly in an open truck. At the zoo grounds Ambika was presented to seven-year-old Peter Marmorek of Granby, whose letter to Mr. Nehru was largely responsible for bringing the elephant to Granby. He wrote to the Indian prime minister that an elephant would be a fine addition to the fast-expanding zoo. The request, plus the diligent work of women's groups, moved the prime minister to send Ambika to Canada.

Survey Women Workers Why women hold down jobs is the object of a survey to be launched shortly by the women's bureau of the federal labor department. The coast-to-coast survey of about 1,000 married career women will be conducted through the social work departments of universities in eight Canadian cities—Halifax, Quebec, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Edmonton and Vancouver.

The object of the survey—first of its kind in Canada—is to find out what types of work married women are doing, why they are working and what effect their working has on family life.

At present more than 400,000 married women are working outside their homes in Canada. They constitute about one-third of all the women in employment. The interviewing will take sev-

eral months and the survey results will not be known for at least a year, officials said.

Good Muffins A 13-year-old Indian boy, Walter Lickers, won first prize at a class for baking muffins at the Six Nations Indian fair at Ohsweken, near Brantford, Ont. Among the competitors was his sister Eleanor.

Blind Piano Tuner Has Many Hobbies

Newcastle, N.B. (CP)—John Ramsay, who has been blind since birth, has returned from Quebec city where he was guest speaker at the annual convention of the American Association of Workers for the Blind.

Mr. Ramsay was invited to speak at the convention because of his work in music with children in his home town. About three years ago he organized a rhythm band and this has grown until today there are two bands with a total of 36 members.

The bands have won top honors in their classes at the Miramichi music festivals and Mr. Ramsay says they are considering entering the provincial festival.

By trade, he is a piano tuner who travels extensively through the northern part of New Brunswick. He is also an amateur radio operator.

Home Folk Overlook Fundy National Park

SAINT JOHN (CP)—Tourist officials say New Brunswickers have overlooked one of the provinces most scenic vacation spots.

The bureau says that of the thousands of visitors to the Fundy National Park each year, only a small minority are from the province itself.

The vacation land features a 130-foot swimming pool of warmed salt water drawn from the Bay of Fundy and a stone's throw away is a nine-hole golf course considered one of the best in eastern Canada.

The recreational facilities of the park cost the federal government about \$3,000,000; took five years to complete. It was officially opened in 1950 by Lieutenant-Governor D. L. MacLaren.
