Eight guardrails were knocked out by the impact. Robert Blake of Guelph had a surprise as he drove down No. 25 highway around Speyside on Saturday. A 300 pound buck ran into the side of his car, causing \$150 damage to the car and killing the deer.

Problems of School In India Revealed
