Remembrance Day, Concert Of Interest

Remembrance Day, which was celebrated in the churches of Milton on Sunday, November 13, was also observed at Halton Manor on that same day. Rev. E. Orsborn, minister of Knox Presbyterian church, Milton, conducted the service in the chapel of the Manor. Mrs. S. Lockie played the accompaniments for the hymns and led in the singing of them with her lovely voice. Mr. Orsborn spoke of three wars that have devastated the world since 1914—the first world war, the second world war and the war in Korea. These have had their origins in atheistic philosophies, philosophies that have contradicted the principles of Christianity. It was in defense of these Christian principles that our men fought and died overseas and it is the principles of the religion of Jesus that are the only way by which world peace can be attained today.
