**Dump Expected To Be Filled Full In Few Months**

Where Acton's dump now spreads over nearly four acres behind the Glenlea subdivision, an east-end park may soon replace this refuse area now filled to near capacity.


Approximately 40 members depicted the various characters. The script for the Old Testament was read by Mr. Lyle Dales and Rev. Jeffares read the script for the New Testament.
