Both teams went all out in the middle session and gave the 1500 fans a good brand of hockey for the series opener. Blackie Clements, one of the top performers for the Chiefs, batted Cracker Evans rebound past Donlevy in the Dunlop net to run the count to 2-0 at 11:43 of the second.

Ted Degray got the Dunlops rolling at 4:48 of the final period firing one past Gilbert from 10 feet out. The Chiefs hung on to their slim one goal lead until the 16:43 mark when Fred Etcher dribbled a shot through Gilbert's pads and sent the game into overtime. Playing coach Bus Gagnon shot what proved to be the winner at 7:25 of the overtime session. Ted O'Connor added an insurance tally less than a minute later, as the

Chiefs wilted under the Whitby attack.

Joe McCann was dumped heavily by burly Alf Treen in the second period. Both teams missed golden scoring chances. The winners showed a well balanced team, plus a sharp passing attack. Kenny McNeil treated the fans to some slick penalty killing.
